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## Preface

It may not be amiss to state that the records herein contained were printed in the main from the First Book of Baltimore Town. Viewed through modern spectacles the handiwork of the recordmaker of 1729 is a queer production.

In giving that handiwork to the general public—now upward of two hundred years after it was begun—an effort has been made to preserve the eccentricities of the English of the day, or, perhaps, as better expressed, the liberties taken with the English of the day have not been disturbed by the transplanting process. They are given very accurately in this—their typographical counterpart.

The pen has been faithfully followed by the type. The one object was to produce the records—spelling, punctuation and all, and to portray, as far as possible, general characteristics. To an extent, at least, this has been accomplished.

Nothing has been taken from; nothing added to the old book. It stands for itself. But its spelling—at times unique; its erratic punctuation (or lack of punctuation, as the matter may be); its quaint phraseology, though transferred from fading lines to printed pages, tell a story of early Baltimore that can be nothing but historically correct. Events were written at a time when history was being made; when the foundation of the now great City of Baltimore was laid.

The records begin with the first session of a Commission which was authorized to select a site for Baltimore Town. It is the doings of this Commission, or rather the Commissioners of Baltimore Town, relative the establishment of boundaries, laying out of streets, "taking up" of lots, etc., from 1729 to the incorporation of the City—1797, that are chronicled.

The printing of these archives will, if it accomplishes no other good, prevent wear and tear upon the originals, for it has not been possible to refuse all requests by those who desired to use the old books and manuscripts in search of information concerning early Baltimore. Likewise the perpetuation of the records is assured even though the originals should, by any lamentable mischance, be destroyed or lost. There are many other reasons that appeal to the writer as arguments why the First Records of Baltimore Town should be given to the public; hence the public has them.

## *Explanatory Note*

The contemplated publication of the First Records of Baltimore Town suggested also the printing of the Act which authorized the erection of Baltimore Town.

A copy of this was, happily, obtained at the State Library, and is given here just as it appears in the original.

Two other Acts, important links in the chain of historical events associated with early Baltimore, are also reproduced, to wit: An Act authorizing the "erection" of Jonas Town, later Jones' Town, on the North (generally referred to as East) bank of Jones' Falls, at the point where that stream is now spanned by Gay street bridge; and another which provided for the consolidation of Baltimore, and Jones' Town under the name of Baltimore Town.

Hence, this volume covers three distinct periods:

First—The "erection" of Baltimore Town—1729.

Second—The "erection" of Jonas (Jones) Town—1732.

Third—The consolidation of Baltimore and Jones Town as Baltimore Town—1745.

As stated, the Acts cited are so directly connected with the town's history and interwoven with the records herein given—in fact, lead up to the latter—that concurrent publication was deemed advisable.

The writer feels it will be generally appreciated that there is a great deal of important history represented by these three laws, and that they constitute a highly fitting and very desirable introduction to the publication of the town records.

Acts and records—taken together—say, as prologue and sequel—give, in their own way, a far better history along certain lines of very early Baltimore than can be written by any latter day individual.

It may be of some interest to note that meagre references to the Act authorizing Baltimore Town are to be found in the unprinted journals of the General Assembly of 1729, in the custody of the Maryland Historical Society. The bill may be traced from July 14th to August 8th, which latter date it was signed by the Governor of the Province. The archives show that "several inhabitants in and about Patapsco River and the rest of the inhabitants of Baltimore County" petitioned the General Assembly for authority to erect Baltimore Town. This petition was presented to the Upper House July 14th, 1729, was "read and recommended to the Consideration of the Lower House of Assembly with the further indorsement 'we the subscribers proprietors of the land mentioned' in the within petition do consent there may an act pass as prayed for \* \* \*

'CHARLES CARROLL,'  
'DANIEL CARROLL,'"

On reading the petition in the Lower House it was "ordered that leave be given to bring in the bill prayed for." The next hint of the

parliamentary progress of the Act is found later in the Upper House journal, as follows: "A bill from the Lower House by Mr. Mathews and Mr. Scott, entitled 'an act for erecting a Town on the North Side of the Patapsco River in Baltimore County' \* \* \* indorsed by the Lower House of Assembly July 23rd, 1729 \* \* \* was read a first and second time and will pass." This prophesy proved true. The journal shows the bill was signed August 8th, 1729, by the Governor, and became a law.

## *Maps---Engravings*

It is hoped the maps contained in this work will be interesting and useful, for it is not pretended that they are ornamental.

It is, likewise, not claimed that they improve the general appearance of the volume, but they can hardly help being of value taken in connection with the data given in print.

It was thought best to have the drawings made on a comprehensive scale; large enough to be of some real assistance to those who might consult them. They were made with the utmost care, and are copies of originals at the City Library.

The majority of lots referred to in these records may be easily located on the maps, and in this way the exact spot where first Baltimoreans reared their homes may be ascertained.

For lots located in later additions to Baltimore Town, that is, later than 1747, to which date the plats given bring the Town, maps at the City Library may be consulted.

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The publication might, perhaps, have been made more attractive had illustrations of a certain class been used. This could easily have been done, and at little expense. Care, however, has been taken to disassociate this compilation with suggestions of a picture book.

There were available, and are yet in the custody of the City Librarian, various old prints of Baltimore which would have made an interesting display. Likewise, photographs of modern Baltimore would have added pictorial attractiveness to these pages, but the object sought, and the idea adhered to and developed has been, not to evolve a pictorial display, more or less fanciful, of old Baltimore, but to give to the public a collection of facts in as convenient form as possible, and to make absolutely certain that each fact is founded upon a "cut and dried" record which can be produced in the original at a moment's notice.

Hence, this is a record; not a picture book. It has been deemed no violation of this policy, that in order to further strengthen the idea of authenticity in the reader's mind, three photographic reproductions, taken from the First Book of Baltimore Town, have been used.

Other than this the suggestion (which at one time amounted to a temptation) to incorporate pictures, was put aside.

ACT OF 1729 AUTHORIZING "ERECTION" OF  
BALTIMORE TOWN.

AN ACT for erecting a Town on the North Side of Patapsco, in Baltemore County; and for laying out in Lots Sixty Acres of Land, in and about the place where one John Fleming now lives.

Whereas, several of the inhabitants of Baltemore County, have, by their Petition to this General Assembly, set forth, That a Town is much wanting on the North Side of Patapsco River; and that it is generally agreed, that Part of the Tract of Land, whereon a certain John Fleming now lives, and suppos'd to be the Right of the Heirs of Charles Carroll, Esq; decease'd; which said Tract is commonly Known by the Name of Cole's Harbour:

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED, *by the Right Honourable the Lord Proprietary, by and with the Advice and Consent of His Lordship's Governour, and the Upper & Lower Houses of Assembly and the Authority of the same*, That Mr. Thomas Tolley, Mr. William Hamilton, Mr. William Bucknar, Doctor George Walker, Mr. Richard Giest, Doctor George Buchanan, Mr. William Hammond, or any Three of them, shall be, and are hereby appointed Commissioners for Baltemore County aforesaid; authorized and empowered, as well to agree for the Buying and Purchasing Sixty Acres of Land out of the Tract aforesaid, and such Part, not exceeding Sixty Acres, as lies most convenient to the Water, as for Surveying and Laying the Same out in the most convenient Manner into Sixty equal Lots, to be erected into a Town.

AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the Commissioners aforesaid, hereinbefore nominated and appointed, or the major Part of them, are hereby impowered sometime before the last Day of September which shall be in the Year of our Lord God, One thousand Seven Hundred and Thirty, to meet together on the Tract of Land aforesaid, or some other convenient Place thereto; and shall then and there treat and agree with the Owner or Owners, and Persons interested in the said Sixty Acres of Land, for the same; and after Pur-

chase thereof, shall cause the same to be surveyor and laid out; and after the same to be so survey'd and laid out, shall cause the same Sixty Acres to be mark'd, stak'd out, and divided into convenient Streets, Lanes, and Allies, as near as may be into Sixty equal Lots, mark'd by some Posts or Stakes towards the Streets, or Lanes, with Number One, Two, Three, Four, and so on to Sixty, to be divided and laid out; of which Lots the Owner or Owners of the said Land shall have his or their first Choice for one Lot; and after such Choice, the remaining Lots may be taken up by others; and that no Person shall presume to purchase more than One Lot within the said Sixty Acres, during the first Four Months after laying out the same; and that the said Lots shall be purchased by the Inhabitants of the County aforesaid.

And in case the said Inhabitants shall not take up the said Lots within Six Months after such laying out as aforesaid, it shall then be lawful for any Person or Persons whatsoever to take up the said Lot or Lots paying the Owner or Owners proportionably for the same. And in Case the Owner or Owners of the aforesaid Sixty Acres of Land, shall wilfully refuse to make Sale of the same, or that through Nonage, Coverture, or any other disability or Impediment whatsoever, are disabled to make such Sale as aforesaid, that then the Commissioners aforesaid, or the major Part of them, shall, and are by Virtue of this Act, authorized, impowered, and required, to issue Warrants under their Hands and Seals, to the sheriff of the said County; which said Sheriff is also hereby required and empowered upon receipt of such Warrants, to impanel and return a Jury of the most substantial Freeholders, Inhabitants within the said County, to be and appear before the said Commissioners, at a certain Day and Time by them to be limited; which Jury, upon their Oaths, shall enquire to whom the said Land belongs, and assess and return what Damages and Recompence they shall think fit to be awarded to the Owners of the said Sixty Acres of Land, and all persons interested therein, according to their several and respective interests: And what Sum of Tobacco the said Jury shall adjudge the said Sixty Acres to be worth, shall be paid to the Owners so found by their Verdict, and all Persons they find interested therein, by such Person or Persons as shall take up the said

Lots, proportionably to their Lot or Lots; which shall give the said Purchaser or Purchasers, their Heirs and assigns, an absolute Estate of Fee Simple, in the said Lot or Lots; he or they complying with the Requisites in this Act mentioned.

AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That the Surveyor of Baltimore County, for the Time being, shall have and receive for Surveying and Laying out the Town aforesaid, the Sum of Fifteen Hundred Pounds of Tobacco, and no more, to be paid and allowed him in the County Levy; and that he return a Plat thereof to the County Clerk, to be by him kept amongst the County Records. And in Case the Taker-up of such Lot or Lots, refuse and neglect to build upon such Lot or Lots within Eighteen Months an House that shall cover Four Hundred square Feet; that then it shall and may be lawful for any other Person or Persons whatsoever, to enter upon the said Lot or Lots, so as aforesaid not built upon, paying such Sum of Tobacco as shall be first set and assessed upon such Lot to the Commissioners aforesaid, or such other Person as the said Commissioners, or the major Part of them, shall nominate and appoint to receive the same for the publick use and Benefit of the said Town, and to be taken up a second Time.

PROVIDED ALWAYS, That such Taker-up or Purchaser build and finish, within Eighteen Months after such his Entry made, such House as in this Act is before limited and appointed to be built by the first Taker-up; which House so built, shall give and settle as good Estates to all Intents and Purposes to such second Taker-up and Builder as aforesaid, his Heirs and Assigns as is in and by this Act before limited and settled upon the first Taker-up and Builder. And in Case any of the said Lots shall be neglected to be taken up in the Town aforesaid, during the Term of Seven Years next after the Publication of this Act, that then, and in such Case, the Owner or Persons interested at the first in such Land, shall, after such Time expired, be possess'd and interested in the said Lot or Lots, as in their first and former Estate: Any Thing in this Act to the contrary notwithstanding.

AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, *by the Authority aforesaid, by and with the Advice and Consent aforesaid*, That the Town aforesaid, be called by the name of Baltimore Town.

AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, *by the Authority aforesaid, by and with the Advice and Consent aforesaid*, That the Commissioners aforesaid, or the major Part of them, employ some sufficient Person for their Clerk; and that they cause such Clerk to take an Oath, that he shall make true and impartial Entries of their Proceedings; and assess reasonable Fees for the said Clerk, to be paid him by the several Takers-up of the said Lots; which said Entries they shall cause to be made up in a well bound Book, and lodged with the Clerk of Baltimore County Court, for the Inspection of any Person.

Saving to His Most Sacred Majesty, his Heirs and Successors, the Right Honourable the Lord Proprietary, his Heirs and Successors, and to all Bodies Politick and Corporate, and all Persons not mentioned in this Act, their several and respective Rights: Any Thing in this Act to the contrary thereof in anywise, notwithstanding

ACT OF 1732 AUTHORIZING "ERECTION" OF JONAS  
TOWN, LATER CALLED JONES TOWN, MERGED  
WITH BALTIMORE TOWN IN 1745.

AN ACT for erecting a Town on a Creek, divided on the East, from the Town lately laid out in Baltimore County, called Baltimore Town, on the Land whereon Edward Fell Keeps Store.

*Be it Enacted, by the Right Honourable the Lord Proprietary by and with the Advice and Consent of his Lordship's Governor and the Upper and Lower Houses of Assembly, and the Authority of the same, That Mr. Thomas Sherdine, Mr. John Cockey, Mr. Robert North, Capt. John Boring, and Mr. Thomas Todd, or any Three of them, shall be and are hereby appointed Commissioners for Baltimore County aforesaid, and are hereby authorized, and impowered, as well to agree for the buying and purchasing Ten Acres of Land out of the Tract aforesaid, and such Part, not exceeding Ten Acres, as lies most convenient to the Water, as for surveying and laying out the same, in the most convenient Manner, into Twenty equal Lots, to be erected into a Town.*

And be it further Enacted, That the Commissioners aforesaid herein before nominated and appointed, or the major Part of them, are hereby empowered, some Time before the Thirtieth Day of November, which shall be in the Year of our Lord God, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Thirty Two, to meet together on the Tract of Land aforesaid, or some other convenient Place adjoining thereto, and then and there treat and agree with the Owner or Owners, and Persons interested in the said Ten Acres of Land, for the same; and after Purchase thereof, shall cause the same to be surveyed, laid out, and divided, as near as may be, into Twenty equal Lots, allowing such sufficient Space or Quantity thereof, for Streets, Lanes, and Alleys, as to them shall seem meet, with Posts or Stakes towards every Street, Lane, or Alley, the said Lots to be numbered One, Two, Three, and so on to Twenty, for the better and more sure distinguishing each Lot from the other; of which Twenty Lots, the Owner or Owners

of the said Land, shall have his or their first Choice for One Lot; and after such Choice, the remaining Lots may be taken up by others: And that no Person shall presume to purchase more than One Lot within the said Ten Acres, during the first Four Months after laying out the same; and that the said Lots shall be purchased by the Inhabitants of the County aforesaid: And in Case the said Inhabitants shall not take up the said Lots within Six Months after such laying out, as aforesaid, it shall then be lawful for any Person or Persons whatsoever, to take up the said Lot or Lots, paying the Owners or Owners proportionably for the same. And in Case the Owner or Owners of the aforesaid Ten Acres, shall wilfully refuse to make sale of the same; or that through Nonage, Coverture, or other Disability or Impediment whatsoever, are disabled to make such Sale, as aforesaid, That then the Commissioners aforesaid, or the major Part of them, shall and are by Virtue of this Act, authorized, empowered, and required, to issue Warrants under their Hands and Seals to the Sheriff of the said County; which said Sheriff is also hereby required and empowered, upon receipt of such Warrants, to empanel and return a Jury of the most substantial Freeholders, Inhabitants within the said County, to be and appear before the said Commissioners, at a certain Day and Time by them to be limited: Which Jury, upon their Oaths, shall enquire to whom the said Land belongs, and assess and return what Damages and recompence they shall think fit to be awarded to the Owners of the said Ten Acres of Land, and to all Persons interested therein, according to their several and respective interests. And what Sum of Tobacco the said Jury shall adjudge the said Ten Acres of Land to be worth shall be paid to the Owners so found by their Verdict, and to all Persons they find interested therein, by such Person or Persons as shall take up the said Lots, proportionably to their Lot or Lots; which shall give the said Purchaser or Purchasers, their Heirs and Assigns, an absolute Estate of Fee Simple in the said Lot or Lots, he or they complying with the Requisites in this Act mentioned.

And be it further Enacted, That the Surveyor of Baltimore County, for the Time being, shall have and receive for surveying and laying out the Town aforesaid, the sum of Four

Hundred Pounds of Tobacco, and no more, to be paid and allowed him in the County Levy; and that he return a Plat thereof to the County Clerk to be by him Kept amongst the County Records. And in Case the Taker-up of such Lot or Lots refuse or neglect to build upon such Lot or Lots, with Eighteen Months, an House that shall cover Four Hundred Square Feet, that then it shall and may be lawful for any other Person or Persons whatsoever, to enter upon the said Lot or Lots, so as aforesaid not built upon, paying such Sum of Tobacco as shall be first set and assessed upon such Lot, to the Commissioners aforesaid, or such other Person as the said Commissioners, or the major Part of them, shall nominate and appoint to receive the same for the Publick Use and Benefit of the said Town, and to be taken upon a Second Time.

Provided always, That such Taker-up or Purchaser build and finish, within Eighteen months after such his Entry made, such House, as in this Act is before limited and appointed to be built by the first Taker-up; which House so built, shall give and settle as good an Estate, to all Intents and Purposes, to such second Taker-up and Builder, as aforesaid, his Heirs and Assigns, and is in and by this Act before limited and settled upon the first Taker-up and Builder. And in Case any of the said Lots shall be neglected to be taken up in the Town aforesaid, during the term of Seven Years next after the Publication of this Act, that then, and in such Case, the Owner, or Persons interested at first in such Land, shall, after such Time expired, be possessed and interested in the said Lot or Lots as in their first and former Estate; anything in this Act to the contrary notwithstanding.

*And be it enacted, by the Authority aforesaid, by and with the Advice & Consent aforesaid, That the Town aforesaid be called by the Name of Jonas Town.*

*And be it further Enacted, by the Authority aforesaid, by and with the Advice and Consent aforesaid That the Commissioners aforesaid, or the major Part of them, employ some sufficient Person for their Clerk; and that they cause such Clerk to take an Oath, that he shall make true and impartial Entries of their Proceedings, and assess reasonable Fees for the said Clerk, to be paid him by the several Takers-up of the said Lots; which said Entries they shall cause to be made*

upon a well bound book, and lodged with the Clerk of Baltimore County Court, for the Inspection of any Person.

Saving to his most Sacred Majesty, his Heirs and Successors, the Right Honourable the Lord Proprietary, his Heirs and Successors, and to all Bodies Politick and Corporate, and all Persons not mentioned in this Act, their several and respective Rights; anything in this Act to the contrary thereof, in any-wise notwithstanding.

*And be it further Enacted, by the Authority, Advice and Consent aforesaid,* That every Person taking up, or being in Possession of any of the Lots taken up in the aforesaid Town, shall be chargeable with, and liable to the Payment of One Penny Current Money of Maryland, per annum, for each Lot, to the Right Honourable the Lord Proprietary, and his Heirs forever; and that the Clerk of the said Commissioners do transmit to his Lordship's Agent, an Account of all Lots taken up, pursuant to the Directions of this Act.

ACT OF 1745 BY VIRTUE OF WHICH BALTIMORE  
AND JONES TOWNS WERE CONSOLIDATED  
UNDER NAME OF BALTIMORE TOWN.

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A supplementary and Additional Act Entitled, An Act for erecting a Town on the North side of Patapsco, in Baltimore County; and for laying out in Lots Sixty acres of Land, in and about the Place where John Fleming now lives: And to an Act entitled, An Act for erecting a Town on a Creek divided on the East from the Town lately laid out in Baltimore County, called Baltimore-Town, on the Land whereon Edward Fell Keeps store.

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Whereas, the Inhabitants of Baltimore and Jone's Towns, in the County of Baltimore, have, by their humble Petition to this General Assembly, set forth, that the said Towns are very conveniently situated in regard to the back Inhabitants, and Navigation on the Head of the North-West Branch of Patapsco River, and only parted by the Head of the said Branch, over which they have erected a good Bridge, which makes a very easy Communication between them, And proves greatly to the Service, not only of the said Town, but Travellers in general: As also that the said Towns, in regard that they are so contiguous to each other, the same might be reduced into one Town, by the name of Baltimore Town; that the several Boundaries, which at present are not, may be well ascertained; and

that Commissioners may be appointed, in order to fully to execute this Act, and see the said Towns carefully surveyed. And further they set forth, that there are several Sums of Money due from Takers-up of Lots in the said Town, in virtue of the several Laws whereby the said Towns were erected, and that the Commissioners to be appointed by this Act may have Power to receive and recover the same, to be applied to the Use of the said Town; and also that the Commissioners to be appointed by this Act may have Succession. They further set forth, that several Lots in the said Towns were not taken up under the former Laws, but that some have since been purchased from the Owners of said Towns; and that it is highly probable all the Lots in the said Towns, not yet taken up or purchased, in a very short Time will. Therefore they humbly pray, that such as have already purchased, or may hereafter purchase Lots, within the original Survey of said Towns, may to all Intents and Purposes have and enjoy, as sure and indefeasible Estates in Fee-Simple, in the said Lots so purchased, or to be purchased, as if the said Lots had been taken up and improved according to the Direction of the Laws that erected the said Towns; and that all Improvements, that are or may be made out of the Water, be secured to the Improver or Improvers, as fully and amply, as if the same had been originally laid out within the Bounds of the said Towns. And further they pray, that no Swine, Sheep, or Geese may be kept or raised within said Town, unless kept in Inclosures. All

which this General Assembly think reasonable to be Enacted.

Be it therefore Enacted by the Right Honourable the Lord Proprietary, by and with the Advice and Consent of his Lordship's Governor, and the Upper and Lower Houses of Assembly, and the Authority of the same, That the same Towns, now called Baltimore and Jone's Town, be incorporated into one entire Town, and for the future called and known by the name of Baltimore-Town, and by no other name, and that the Bridge the inhabitants of said Town have built on the Branch that divided said Towns, be for the future deemed a public Bridge, repaired and kept passable for Man, Horse, Cart, or Wagon, for the future at the Expense and charge of Baltimore County.

The two towns to be incorporated into one town.

And be it further Enacted, That Major William Hammond, Capt. Robt. North, Capt. Thomas Sheredine, Dr. George Buchanan, Col. William Hammond, Capt. Robert North, Capt. Darby Lux, Mr. Thomas Harrison, and Mr. William Fell, be and are hereby appointed Commissioners, in order to see this present Act, and the former Acts relating to the Towns before mentioned, put in Execution; and that they cause the said Towns, to be carefully surveyed by the Out-Lines of said Towns, and therein include the Branch over which the Bridge is built; and that they from time to time cause all the Lots taken up and improved, or that hereafter shall be taken up and improved, to be regularly surveyed, substantially and fairly bounded, and numbered, in order

Commissioners appointed for the said Towns.

to prevent any Disputes that may happen touching the Right to any the said Lots, or any Part of them.

**On the Death or Removal of a Commissioner, a new one is to be chosen.**

And be it further Enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That when and as often as any of the said Commissioners shall die, remove out of the County, or decline and refuse to act as Commissioner, that then the major Part of the Commissioners for the Time being shall, in the Room of such Commissioner, appoint and nominate another to serve, in the Stead of such Commission so dying, removing or refusing to serve. And that should any Dispute hereafter arise, touching the Bounds of any Lot or Lots within the same Town, that the same shall be fully determined by the said Commissioners, or the major Part of them: And to prevent any Partiality that may be used therein, that the said Commissioners or the major Part of them, meet at least once a Year, and then see that a Boundary to each Lot be kept up and preserved in Manner before prescribed; and in case any be decayed, that they cause other sufficient Boundary to be fixed in the Room of any missing or decayed.

**Commissioners to appoint Clerk.**

And forasmuch that this, and other Matters in this Act contained, will greatly tend to the Security of the Inhabitants of said Town, and the Preservation of their Rights; Be it also Enacted, That the said Commissioners have Power, by this Act, to employ a Clerk, who shall be under Oath, fairly and honestly to enter in a Book, to be kept for that Purpose, all the Proceedings of said Com-

missioners relating to said Town; in which Book, amongst other Things, shall be kept a fair Plat of said Town, neatly platted, describing every Lot, by its right Number, and who the Taker-up was or shall be; and that all or any the said Commissioners, and their successors, shall have Recourse to the Clerk's Book or Books, as frequently as he or they please, without Fee or Reward, the better to prevent any Corruption.

But in regard the Clerk and Surveyor, for their Trouble, must have some Reward, Be it Enacted, That the said Commissioners, or the major Part of them, may levy, assess, and take by way of Distress if needful, from the Inhabitants of said Town, by even and equal Proportion, the sum of three Pounds yearly for the Encouragement of their Clerk, to be paid to him, and that they have Power to place and displace their Clerk as often as they shall think fit: And that the County-Court of Baltimore have Power, and hereby are required, at the Request of said Commissioners, or the major Part of them, to levy on the taxable Inhabitants of said County, any sum not exceeding fifteen hundred Pounds of Tobacco, for the Use of the Surveyor, or Person that shall be employed in surveying and laying out the said Town.

And whereas it is suggested there are sundry sums of Money, due and owing to the first Commissioners nominated for said Towns, from several Takers-up of Lots in said Towns, under the original Laws for laying them out; Be it Enacted, That the present Commissioners and their suc-

cessors or the major Part of them, may by due Course of Law, or in any other Legal Manner, in the name of the said Commissioners, or the major Part of them, take, demand, receive, and recover the same, wherever any Sum of Money, by virtue of the original Laws for laying out said Towns, shall be found due; which said Commissioners, or the major Part of them, shall apply to the Uses intended by the said original Law for laying out the said Towns and in no other Manner.

And whereas there are several Lots within the Limits of said Towns, and the Out Bounds of them, untaken up, and that hereafter may be purchased from the Proprietors of said Lands; Be it Enacted, that all After Purchasers shall be deemed to be within said Town, and that such After Purchasers, whether before or after the making of this Act, shall be deemed to be within the said Town; provided their Lots shall be within the Out Lines of said Town; and have as good Estate in their Lots, as if, taken up, improved, and paid for, under the original Laws erecting said Towns.

And be it further Enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That all Improvements of what kind soever, Either Wharfs, Houses, or other Buildings, that have, or shall be made out of the Water, or where it usually flows, as an Encouragement to such Improvers, be forever deemed the Right, Title, and Inheritance of such Improver or Improvers, their Heirs and Assigns for ever.

And be it further Enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That it shall not hereafter be lawful for any Person or Persons whatsoever, to keep or raise any Swine, Sheep, or Geese, within the said Town, unless they be well inclosed in some Lot or Pen.

And whereas there are several very valuable Improvements made in said Towns, by Virtue of the Laws already made, and whereby they were erected into Towns; Be it Enacted by the Authority aforesaid, by and with the Advice and Consent aforesaid. That all Takers-up of Lots, and former and after Purchasers under this or the former Laws, complying with the Requisites directed by such former Laws and this, shall have a sure and indefeasible Estate of Inheritance in Fee Simple in said Lots taken up by him or them; any Law, Usage, or Custom, to the contrary notwithstanding

On the following page begin the actual records of the town, to wit: the minutes of the First meeting of the Commission which selected the site for Baltimore.

Except in one instance, headings, foot notes, and marginal annotations have been omitted in order that the printed pages might conform as nearly as possible to the originals. Throughout this book the name of the new town is spelled two ways—Baltemore and Baltimore. The former mode is not only peculiar to the records themselves, up to a certain point, but appears also in the original legislative act authorizing the "erection" of the town. In the course of compilation, however, when it became necessary to write the name—as in the title, or in a headline, the more modern form of spelling was employed.

The said Hammond is impowered to discount with the several persons from whom the same is or shall become Due at the rate of Ten shillgs p Cent.

It is likewise ordered that the Clerk give Mr. Thomas Franklin Notice in writing to meet the Comrs. on the seventeenth instant, in Order to agree for resurveying the Town & making a plan thereof—
