SIR: In obedience to the resolution of the House of Representatives, of the 26th of February last, referring to this Department the memorial of the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, claiming allowance and pay for advances of money and supplies furnished, during the late war, in defence of that city and the country adjacent, I have the honor to transmit, herewith, a letter from the Third Auditor, dated the 27th of March, accompanied by an explanatory statement, marked A. This statement particularly sets forth the items, constituting, in the whole, the sum of fifteen thousand one hundred and fifty-nine dollars nine cents, heretofore suspended or disallowed on the settlement of the above claim under the direction of the Secretary of War, with the reasons for such disallowance or suspension. The claim rests upon services highly meritorious, the good effects of which were felt by the nation; and a large portion of the rejected items appears to have been thrown out, not from any objection to their equity, but from the fixed rules and limited powers under which the Executive and accounting officers are obliged to act in the settlement of the public accounts. From these rules they did not feel at liberty to swerve, even in such a case as the present. The want of vouchers formed the objection upon which the disallowance of other items rested: all which is fully explained in the document above mentioned. The efforts of the memorialists were identified with the common cause of the country at a season of difficulty and peril, and it follows, from the letter and statement of the Third Auditor, that they cannot receive adequate indemnification for the expenditures which those efforts involved, (and they ask nothing beyond indemnification) but through Congress.

Returning the papers which accompanied the resolution of the House,

To the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States :

The memorial of the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore,

RESPECTFULLY REPRESENTS :

That, some years ago, your memorialists preferred a claim against the United States for a large sum of money expended by them in the defence of their country, in the late war with Great Britain, and they exhibited various documents, which are now filed in the office of the Third Auditor, showing that they were compelled to borrow, for that purpose, and did borrow and pay the regular bank interest until 1818, when the debt was funded in city six per cent. stock, the sum of seventy-five thousand dollars, (\$75,000,) which they expended, over and above the voluntary contributions of the citizens of Baltimore, amounting to more than twenty-five thousand dollars, (\$25,000,); that part of their claim was paid, and the balance of (\$15,159 09,) fifteen thousand one hundred and fifty-nine dollars and nine cents, was rejected by the Secretary of War, not because the same was not admitted by him to have been necessarily expended in the defence of the city of Baltimore, but because a part of it was not sustained by vouchers in strict accordance with the rules of the Department, as established under the existing laws ; and because a part consisted of charges which that office deemed not proper to be made against the United States. Your memorialists state that they did not at that time trouble your honorable body upon the subject, but accepted the amount which the Secretary of War conceived himself authorized to admit under the provisions of the laws as they existed, and did not submit the question as to their rejected claims to the consideration of Congress. Your memorialists further state, that, when they received payment for their *admitted* claims, interest upon the same was refused upon the ground of the established usage that Government never paid interest ; but, at a subsequent period, your honorable body thought fit to disavow this usage, and passed a law granting interest to the State of Virginia upon the amount advanced by her, during the late war, towards the defence of the country ; and, at the last session of Congress, this principle was again recognized in the case of your memorialists, who received, under your authority, interest upon the whole of their admitted claim.

Your memorialists are now induced to apply to your honorable body for a consideration of their claim, as originally submitted to the Secretary of War, in the hope that, when the circumstances under which the debt was contracted are fully investigated, it will be found no more than just to pay to your memorialist a large part of the rejected amount of \$15,159 09, if not the whole, together with interest on such part, or the whole, as may seem fit.

Your memorialists beg leave to state to your honorable body, that nearly \$7,000 of the rejected amount is the difference between seamen's wages, at sixteen dollars per month, and the pay of militia-men, at eight dollars per month. Your memorialists were compelled, from their peculiar situation, in the year 1813, to employ, as means of defence, barges and look-out boats; and it will be within the recollection of your honorable body, that this species of defence was sanctioned and approved by the Government, who subsequently established, in the succeeding year, a flotilla, under the command of Commodore Barney, for the defence of the Chesapeake and its tributary waters. Those barges and look-out boats having been advised and recommended by the officers commanding at Baltimore, it became necessary to man them, and as that port was blockaded by the enemy, and the seamen were constantly leaving it for the neighboring ports of Philadelphia and New York, where they could get employment, your memorialists were obliged to pay them the same wages they could have obtained at those places, and did so accordingly. When this item came before the Secretary of War, he did not reject it upon the grounds that the expenditure was unnecessary, or not called for, but declared that he could not, under the law by which he must be governed, allow them more wages than were provided for soldiers or militia-men, and accordingly rejected so much of the amount as exceeded eight dollars per month. However proper it may have been, and undoubtedly was, for the Secretary of War, acting under the provisions of laws which he was bound to obey, to reject the claim of your memorialists, they humbly conceive that, if your honorable body should be satisfied of the necessity of the expenditure, and that the money was not wastefully, but, on the contrary, judiciously applied, they will not hesitate to direct its being refunded with interest.

Your memorialists beg leave respectfully to state to your honorable body, that, although the proofs of the disbursements made by the city of Baltimore were not such as would justify the Secretary of War in passing them as vouchers, yet they were sufficient to satisfy him that the whole amount claimed had been actually expended in the defence of the city, over and above a heavy amount of voluntary contributions. And when your honorable body consider that the citizens of Baltimore made many sacrifices, (if any thing can be called a sacrifice when the rights of our country are at stake;) that they garrisoned the forts in the neighborhood with their volunteer artillery and infantry; that they erected works and fortifications, and performed many other duties as soldiers, before they were called into the public service and pay of the United States, and for which they never received, nor claimed, or expected compensation; that these services and the defence which they afterwards made, were greatly instrumental in the preservation of their own city, and, thereby, of other cities of the Union, from the devastation threatened by the enemy along our sea-boards; and that their Committee of Vigilance and Safety, through whose hands the money borrowed by your memorialists passed, were unacquainted with the mode of keeping accounts as prescribed by the offices at Washing-

ton, but acted nevertheless according to the best of their ability. When all these circumstances are duly considered, and when it is also recollected that some of the expenditures were made at a period of great peril, when an invading enemy was advancing from the destruction of our Capital, against the home of your memorialists, who were then unable to obtain the immediate assistance of Government, your memorialists confidently trust they will be dealt with in that spirit of liberality which ought to characterise the representatives of a great People.

Your memorialists, therefore, pray your honorable body to take their case into consideration, and to grant them such relief as may appear just and reasonable; and they, as in duty bound, will pray, &c.

STATEMENT of the items constituting the sum of \$ 15,159 09, being the difference between the amount charged by the Corporation of the City of Baltimore, in their account with the United States, for expenditures during the late war, and that allowed under the decision of the Secretary of War, with the remarks.

No. of voucher.	In whose name charged.	Amount disallowed.	Particulars, and reasons for disallowance.
57	George Stiles - -	\$ 286 46	This sum was charged by the committee in their Abstract A, as a payment to George Stiles, for sundry articles for the marine battery, but for which there was no voucher on file with the abstract. The same sum being found to be included in an account paid to George Stiles for seamen's wages, articles for the marine battery, &c. (voucher No. 4. in abstract H) in which the items constituting the \$ 286 46 are designated. This amount was disallowed, as being twice charged by the Corporation to the United States.
10	Randall Moale - -	150 00	This is an account in which "the Committee of Supplies are made debtor" to the 1st regiment of artillery "for this sum, being for an appropriation for music for the said regiment, \$ 150, and receipted by "R. Moale, as Quartermaster 1st Regiment." There was no law to authorize the admission of such a charge against the United States, unless evidence of the actual expenditure by the Quartermaster had been produced, and that the objects were such as were provided for by existing regulations. If the charge is for the services of musicians, the regiment was entitled to music; and the number employed, within the regulations, could be paid only on being mustered on the rolls of the regiment, and for the time they served, at the usual rate allowed by law. Under these circumstances the charge was disallowed.

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7	John Hargrove	-	10 00	A charge for the hire of a horse for Captain Mix to proceed to the shore near the enemy's ships, to ascertain whether torpedoes could be used against them with probability of success. Disallowed by the Secretary of War.
8	John Stricker	-	16 00	For a payment to George Kaler for hams, whiskey, and bread, \$ 6, and \$ 10 paid McClackner, the purpose not named, and no receipt produced by General Stricker for the payment to McC. Disallowed by the Secretary of War.
10	Thomas & Caldclugh	-	30 00	For a Telescope purchased by Major Barney. If it was necessary for the officer to have a telescope, evidence must be produced that the article was properly disposed of and accounted for, before the United States can be chargeable.
1 & 2	254 stand of arms	-	3,048 00	This charge is predicated on orders from the Major General to deliver arms to the 5th and 51st Maryland regiments, and receipts for the issue of 254 stands, in April, 1813. The United States having paid the expenses of transporting 500 stand of arms from Fredericktown, in April, 1813, incurred by the city of Baltimore, and the corporation, it appears, having received payment from the State of Maryland for 526 stand of arms, it is presumable that the above 254 stand were a part, either of those received by the corporation from the arsenal at Fredericktown, or of those for which they received payment through the State of Maryland. Under these circumstances, and there being no evidence of the actual purchase and cost of the article, the charge was disallowed.
3	Thomas Rogers	-	100 00	For his services as Secretary attending the Committee of Accounts. There is no period of service stated, nor is there any law or regulation to authorize such a charge against the United States. The voucher was submitted to, and disallowed by, the Secretary of War.

7	Adjutant L. Taylor -	\$ 186 00	This amount is for sundry items embraced in an account made out by Adjutant Taylor, for the 5th regiment of cavalry, amounting to \$323 75, of which the Committee of Supplies allowed and paid him \$245 75. The items here disallowed were, for the purchase of a horse, payments to a trumpeter, &c. for which there were no receipts produced from the individuals, nor is it stated for what, or for whose use, the horse was purchased, or the after disposition made of him; nor is it stated whether the payments to the trumpeter were for his services, or for other purposes. For these reasons, the \$186 were disallowed.
8	Thadens Jackson -	49 50	For hay and quarters for horse and horsemen, on the nights of the 15th to 23d August, 1813, consisting of from seven to nineteen men. The horsemen thus supplied do not appear to have been called into the service of the United States in the above period. The account was, therefore, disallowed, as a charge not admissible against the United States.
9 to 14	Sundry Musicians -	189 80	These vouchers, No. 9 to 14, are for payments to sundry hired music, at the rate of four and five dollars per day, amounting to \$234. The regulations existing at the time authorized an allowance for hired music at the rate of fifteen dollars per month, and one ration per day. The difference between the sum paid by the committee and the sum allowable by the regulations is the amount above disallowed.

15	Col. K. Long -	-	79 00	Sundry expenditures for the use of the 27th Maryland regiment, in April and May, 1813. The vouchers for the account are imperfect—no receipts to Colonel Long for the payment of the money—besides which, the articles were had when the regiment was not in the service of the United States, and the expenditure, therefore, not chargeable to the United States.
16	Do -	-	50 13	This account is for the hire of armorers and assistant armorers, at \$1 50. and \$1 per day, for the use of the 27th regiment. The same remarks apply to this account as are made on No. 15, above.
17	John Gambut -	-	4 50	For screw-drivers, ramrod, &c. in May, 1813, for the 27th regiment. The same remarks as on No. 15 and 16 apply to this voucher.
49, 50,	51, 53, 54, 55, & 58		687 02	These vouchers are for expenditures which relate to the repairs of a powder magazine at Towson's, services of a superintendent, hauling powder, &c. Expenditures of this description at a magazine, the property of the State or city of Baltimore, are not chargeable to the United States. The amount claimed on these vouchers was, therefore, disallowed.
52	George McKenzie -	-	67 50	For 46 horseman's sword scabbards, and 10 do. sword belts. Militia cavalry are to supply themselves with arms and accoutrements, and, while in the service of the United States, receive compensation, in addition to their pay, for the use and risk thereof. Expenditures, therefore, of this description, are not chargeable to the United States; and the amount of this account was, accordingly, disallowed.
56	G. Meyer -	-	29 00	For mounting thirteen swords. The same remarks apply to this charge as to voucher 52.
57	E. Hubball -	-	79 00	For mounting thirty scabbards with brass for cavalry, and mounting two plain. Disallowed for the reasons assigned on voucher 52.

115	George Keyser -	\$ 226 94	This charge is predicated on the receipt of Major Keyser, for the payment of so much due to Captain Kennedy's company, for one week's services at North Point. This advance has already been allowed, being embraced in the accounts of the Committee of Supplies in a settlement made on the 8th January, 1816, and is, therefore, now not admissible.
117	Capt. D. Scharzum -	11 10	For the hire of a drummer and fifer for his company, three days in May and July, 1813, at \$ 5 per day. The regulations of the War Department, in relation to hired music in the late war, confined the allowance to \$ 15 per month, and one ration per day. That allowance has been admitted in this case, and the difference, being \$ 11 10, was accordingly disallowed.
44	James Belt -	30 00	In the account of James Belt, for ship Chandlery, for the galley Vigilant, a charge of \$ 30 for a telescope is included. The expenditure was not authorized by law or any regulation of the War Department; besides, the subsequent disposition made of the article is not shown. It was disallowed by the Secretary of War.
72	William Vance & Co. -	240 00	The Committee of Supplies charge for a payment to Mr. Vance, for 43 and 20 muskets, at \$ 12 each, amounting to \$ 756. On one of the vouchers, that for 20 muskets, it is remarked: "This account has been paid to Captain Deshon, and charged on the books." Voucher No. 71 is Captain Deshon's account for 100 muskets, on which the Corporation has received a credit for

			§ 1200. This part of voucher 72, for 240 dollars, was, therefore, improperly charged to the United States, and, accordingly, disallowed.
86	William Flanagan -	534 99	In this man's account, amounting to \$ 1,105 95, there are charges for payments to sundry persons, amounting to \$ 534 99, for which there are no bills or receipts produced. The amount was, therefore, disallowed.
1	Capt. S. Bunbury -	280 81	The account of Captain Bunbury is for seamen's wages on board the galley Vigilant. The men were paid at the rate of \$ 15 per month, amounting to \$ 667 13. The allowance made by the Secretary of War was at the rate of \$ 8 per month, the pay of a private soldier. The difference between the rate paid and the rate allowed being \$ 280 81, that sum was deducted.
2	Capt. James Clayton -	597 50	His account against the galley Vigilant, amounting to this sum, being for payments to officers and seamen, but for which there are no receipts produced from the individuals to whom the payments were made, nor is the time or rate of service stated, or number of men employed. The whole amount of the account was, therefore, disallowed.
3	Capt. Solomon Rutter -	193 86	His account for payment of men on board the launches at the Lazaretto, paid at the rate of \$ 5 per week, amounting to \$ 313. Under the decision of the Secretary of War an allowance of \$ 8 per month was made, and the difference, \$ 193 86, accordingly deducted.

The Hon. PETER LITTLE :

SIR : Your letter of the 21st current, to the Mayor, was referred to me, as agent for the Corporation, this morning, with directions from him to answer it.

When in Washington, 11th ultimo, at which time I had the pleasure of calling upon you, I received from the Third Auditor such papers *only*, relative to the rejected part of our claim, as were unconnected with other papers, parts of which had been allowed, and parts disallowed, by the Secretary of War : the consequence is, that the documents in hand fall short of the amount claimed. Under these circumstances, it was thought best to refer, in the memorial, to Mr. Hagner, for the proofs, and to return the papers I received from him last month, to his office. The papers, however, owing to my not having received precise orders, are still in my hands, and I pray you, Sir, to instruct me on the subject at as early a day as you can find convenient. You are aware that the balance now claimed was rejected on account of the want of proper vouchers, and alleged improper charges : the amount was, nevertheless, expended in the service of the United States.
