Swivel-Chair Heroes Ordered Out It is reported that sustained criticism by Congress of the swivel chair Army officers still stationed in Washington has resulted in an order being quietly passed around in the War Department to dispense with all possible officers now assigned to the Capital. The number now on duty there is said to be in excess of 1.000. That is a great reduction from those assigned to Washington during the war, but it is felt that the number should be still further cut in view of the fact that the war work is being rapidly wound up.

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
