Included in the destruction of these boats were immense stores of provisions, twenty thousand pounds of bacon and a thousand cases of ammunition. -Captures of horses, mules and beef cattle, to the number of over a thousand, were made. The celebrated salt mine or salt rock was captured, and the rebel works destroyed. The rebel soldiers were not 10th to be captured, and over 1600 are in our hands, and more are being taken.

A dispatch from Gen. McNeil, at Cape Girardeau, says that on the morning of the 26th, after first demanding his surrender, to which a defiant reply was returned, the rebels, about 8000 strong, under Major Gen. Price, attacked his position, and, after three hours' hard fighting, were handsomely repulsed, with severe less, and were retreating. A later dispatch, dated the 27th, says that Gen. Vandever came on the enemy's rear near Cape Girardeau last night, attacked and routed him, taking a large number of prisoners, horses, arms, &c. The enemy were in rapid retreat, and closely pursued.

From California we learn that the Union League movement has been inaugurated there by a great meeting at Sacramento city, at which speeches were delivered by Gen. Wright, Senator Conness, Gov. Stanford and others. The United States government has purchased a number of steamers at San Francisco for coast service. A bill has passed the Legislature granting aid from the State to the Pacific Railroad Company, to the extent of \$10,-000 per mile. This appropriation, with that already secured, guarantees the completion of the work.
