The Senate amendment did make such a proposition, as well as opened the door to office for all, and the defeat of that amendment makes clear and undeniable that the kind of suffrage now proposed by Congress is impartial, (that is, for each separate State.) and not universal suffrage, by impartial being meant that suffrage may be made conditional or qualified, only the qualification shall be by modes which do not make race or color a reason for disfranchisement. commission exceed \$300. The Court say: "By the 33d section of the bankrupt act, a debtor whose assets charged unless by the assent of a majority in number and value of his creditors who a discharge by complying with its provisions, the law does not apply to a case where a party is liable to fail in obtaining his discharge by reason of the refusal of said creditors to give their assent.

"This is a mistaken construction of the court does not depend upon the right of the party ultimately to obtain his discharge. This may be denied to him for various causes enumerated in the law, and can be determined only by facts and circumstances disclosed in the progress of the cause .-After the jurisdiction has attached, it is not essential to the jurisdiction that the party shall appear to be entitled to a discharge without the consent of his creditors.
