TARTICULAR ATTENTION is invited to I the following sections of the Public General Laws of Maryland, under the title "Crimes

SEC. 159. If any person shall place anything, or cause anything to be placed, on any railroad in this State, calculated to obstruct, overthrow or direct from the track of such railroad any car, vehicle or carriage, travelling or passing on such railroad, or shall break or injure in any manner any railroad in this State, with the view or intent to obstruct or overthrow any car, vehicle or carriage, such person so offending shall be deemed guilty of felony, and upon conviction thereof, shall be sentenced to the penitentiary for not less than two years nor more than ten years.

any railroad, or by breaking or injuring any railroad, or any bridge attached thereto, in violation of the preceding section, then the person so placing the thing, or obstructing, or breaking or injuring, shall be deemed guilty The above law will be rigidly enforced so far as it relates to railroads under the control

of the Kent County Railroad Company.
