

THE first American Free Trade Zone will soon be established near New York. It covers 18 acres of land, 60 acres of water, including wharves and warehouses to be constructed within nine months and to be administered by a corporation formed by the City of New York. A barrier will effectually preclude the possibility of smuggling goods into the United States. The purpose of the zone is to permit foreign goods to be shipped to the port where they will be repacked or combined with domestic merchandise for reshipment to foreign countries. By establishing the Free Trade Zone custom formalities are

COMETIME in the late summer the O Treasury Department will ship about \$3,000,000,000 worth of gold bullion to Fort Knox, Ky., where it will be stored in the new underground vault. The shipments will be made by parcel post, which will cost about \$600,000. The postal service has already moved more than \$2,000,000,000 from the San Francisco mint to Denver. The job took Hauling - Excavating four months and twenty-five trains. The gold bars and coins weighed 4,743 pounds and was guarded by postal in-

spectors, secret service men, railroad police and soldiers.
