Local Farmers Look Forward To Better Prices For Raw Milk

Inter-State Milk Producers' Association Makes Formal Request To New Jersey And Pennsylvania Authorities For Increase In Price

General Manager Lauterbach Sees Urgent Need Of Price Increase And Points To Advance Costs To Producers Caused By Pasture Shortage And Advancing Grain Prices

Farmers in Cecil county who are selling milk to dairy companies in Phila-delphia and nearby cities may look for-ward to higher prices in the near futer-State Milk Producers' Association, dairy farmers' cooperative. Officers of that Association have made this request which crosses state lines.

A slight increase has already been More Than Two Hundred obtained for New Jersey farmers selling within their own state and a further increase is probable, according to advices from the Inter-State office. The second increase appears to depend upon similar increases in the rest of the milk shed. Discussions This Week
