Pictures prevail in the book, the pages being packed with them, with comparatively little reading matter, and the art work throughout, especially the main division drawings, is of a caliber sedom, if ever, seen in annuals produced at an institution of Maryland's size.

The book, which is dedicated to Dr. W. W. Skinner, chairman of the Board of Regents of the University, also pays its high respects to H. C. Byrd, "the builder of the institution", who recently was made its president, and to the various educational departments, but it is the minute portrayal of the campus and its every-day activities that make the publication outstanding. It truly is a 1935-36 "album of the University". Seven Major Sections

The book has seven major divisions. They are: The Universitywhich includes the views and administrative branches; Classeswhich embrace the seniors with the various colleges treated separately; Activities—which include student government, publications, military, dramatics, music, social life, and organizations; Athletics-major, freshman and intramural; a com-Women's section; Fraternities, honorary and social; and University Life. All are marked by photography of a high order, the Athletic and University Life sections being especially noteworthy from this standpoint.
