Tome Wallops Old Foe In Annual Football Classic

Gilman Stopped At Every Turn As Tome Gridders March To Victory

Outweighed and outplayed, a game Gilman eleven went down to defeat, 27 to 0, at the hands of the Tome team last

Friday at Port Deposit. Tome's superiority on the ground was directly responsible for three of the touchdowns scored, and played a large part in the fourth.

Gilman kicked off, aided by a strong wind, to the 20-yard line, from which the ball was run back to the Tome 35. A fumble on the 45 lost 10 yards for Tome, and Murphy punted to the Gilman 40. Stan Gary kicked outside on the Tome 8. After several yards were gained on running plays, the Tome half puted to the Tome 36. Failing to make the necessary yardage Gary punted over the goal line.

Tome then started to roll. Owens cut off right tackle and drove to the 36 before being downed. When the first quarter ended Tome was on the Gilman 38, first and 10. Graber then drove through center down to the 20.

Ends Tome's First Threat

An 8-yard plunge off tackle put the ball on the Gilman 12 with first down, and Murphy drove through to the 8. A fumble, recovered by Tome, lost another down, and Nance intercepted a pass to end Tome's first threat.

An exchange of kicks put the ball on the Gilman 30. A poor punt to the Gilman 40 put Tome again in position to score, and Tome lost no time in taking advantage of it. On the next play Murphy ran off tackle, broke through the Gilman secondary, and went over for the touchdown. Reid, substitute guard, came in and placekicked the extra point.

The remainder of the second period saw Gilman bringing into action its usually effective passing attack. Nance intercepted a Tome pass on his own 30, and on the next play(Graber interfered with Westerlind as he was about to receive a pass, giving Gilman the ball on the midfield stripe. A pass to Nance on the 40 and another gave Gilman the ball on the Tome 30, when the half ended.

Braddock Will Not Box Exhibitions


