HELP THE FEDERAL AMENDMENT

Bristow-Mondell Amendment to Be Voted On in the House on December 29.

The vote on the Bristow-Mondell Amendment has been postponed, and the bill will probably be reported out not later than Tuesday, Decem-

her 20. Meanwhile all possible pressure should be brought to bear upon Maryland's representatives in Congress.

All county and city leagues should pass special resolutions urging Maryland's representatives to cast their votes for the amendment, and all true suffragists should write or telegraph without delay to the members of Congress from Maryland.

Address all the congressmen at the House of Representatives, Washington, D. C., and make your letter very brief, but to the point. A telegram or a special delivery letter will be much more impressive than an ordinary letter, but even a postcard is better than nothing.
