## GALENA CATTLE SHOW DRAWS HUGE ENTRY

The Fourth Annual Kent-Cecil District Dairy Field Day was held at Galena for dairy cattle breeders of the two counties. One hundred ten of the finest specimen of the four major dairy breeds were led before the two judges who awarded the ribbons. All cattle were classified by the judges in addition to the regular way of judging. Animals which scored 85 or more points, based on the official score card, were put in the blue group. Animals scoring between 75 and 85 points were classified as good and put in the red group. Animals scoring below 75 were considered fair and put in the white group. This method enabled breeders to evaluate their animals regarding desirable type. Mr. Floyd Arnold, Extension Dairyman, University of Maryland, judged the Ayrshire and Guernsey breeds, while Mr. Richard N. Wills of McDonough School judg-
