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"ISSUE" IS SUE CREEK

Proposition Is Up To County Delegation, Who "Fish" In Their Dreams—Told About It.

Annapolis, Md.—The predominant and overshadowing "issue" before the Legislature, so far as the Baltimore County Delegation is concerned, is Sue Creek.

A great many of our readers, we dare say, have never heard of Sue Creek, but not so with the County Delegation. They have been hearing about it ever since the Legislature convened, in session and out of session, in the day time and in the night time, until they have become so full of the subject that they "fish" in their dreams, some with hook and line and others with nets.

Sue Creek, it seems, is a tributary of Middle River, which flows into the neck section of Baltimore county, and it's a great place for fish and fishing. Fish of all varieties swarm there in the springtime, and multiply, as only fish can. The mouth of Sue Creek is narrow—like unto the neck of a bottle—further back it spreads out and covers a considerable area, affording innumerable fishing shores. Right about the middle of the ford said neck is an island, and this island is owned by a gentleman who stands high in the estimation of certain very practical politicians in the southwestern section of the county and in Baltimore city.

In 1914, or thereabouts, the Legislature passed a law making it unlawful for anyone to fish with nets or traps of any kind in Sue Creek. This was a sad blow to the owner of the island, and ever since that time he has been seeking to have the law repealed.

Since that time the lives of all the Baltimore County Delegates have been made miserable. They have been seen in conversation in behalf of the man on the island and also by delegations in behalf of the innumerable hook-and-line fishermen who live on the island.

Let us hope that Sue Creek will not prove to be the "Salt River" to any of the County Delegates hereafter. Hereafter seek further political honors!
