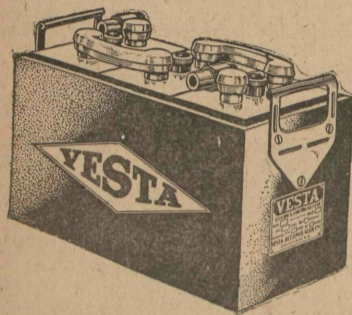

Miss Myrtle Zinkhan has returned to her home after spending some time with Mr. and Mrs. Edward Troyer.

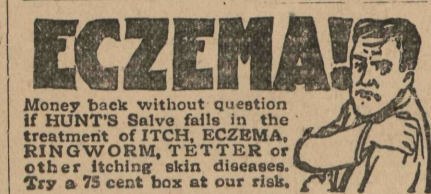
GARRISON.

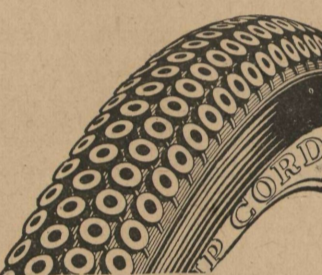
