Health Director Issues Rabbit Fever Warning

Points Out Importance Of Careful Handling In Dressing

Dr. Robert H. Riley, Director of the State Department of Health, has issued a timely warning to hunters and to all who have any occasion to handle wild

He said "Avoid the animal that moves slowly and seems dazed. That is the kind of animal that is likely to be diseased and to be a carrier of the germs that cause rabbit fever in human beings. The disease is spread from animal to animal through the bite of infected ticks. Human beings contract it in handling or skinning diseased rabbitts, in crushing infected ticks, through the bite of the ticks, and also

through biting flies." He also issued the following directions in handling rabbits, to be sure that the person is not infected: "Bag only healthy animals; Don't handle the game with bare hands, when preparing the meat for the market or table. Use rubber gloves. Do not allow any open cut or scratch to come in contact with the rabbits. Keep your hands away from your face and eyes. The infectious material may be absorbed through a mere scratch or break in the skin. Burn the paper or wrappings that have been in contact with the game. Cook the rab-

bit meat thoroughly." So far the disease, rabbit fever, or scientifically known as tuleremia, has been found only in wild rabbits. Thorough cooking of the meat destroys all

Tuleremia was placed on the list of reportable diseases in 1928. Since then 193 cases and 21 deaths have been recorded in the state. 106 cases and 9 deaths in the counties; 87 cases and 12 deaths in Baltimore City.

One case of the fever was reported year. This occurred last winter.


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


