The story of the first rise of the Guernsey breed to importance among Queen Anne's county cattle is the story of four bulls. The story of its present importance in the Guernsey world is a continuation of the earlier theme, plus the establishment of several top flight herds, notably those of Pioneer Point, My

Lord's Gift, and Blakeford. Queen Anne's is strictly an agricultural county. For much of the last hundred years its major crop rotation has been wrapped around wheat, corn and hay. With the advent of better transportation and the cry for milk from large cities, particularly Philadelphia and Washington, dairying emerged among the major sources of farm incomes.
