Not particularly interested in the show ring, Mr. Moffett lays greatest emphasis upon production and his showing of cattle at the Eastern Shore Guernsey Breeders event marks his only venture into type competition.

The manager of the estate is Guy E. Harmon, secretary-treasurer of the Eastern Shore Guernsey Breeders Association and general chairman of the Guernsey Breeders show, who was manager of the Homestead Farms near Salisbury prior to coming to Blakeford. A graduate of Ames College in Iowa, Mr. Harmon learned his groundwork about Guernseys an the estate of Lothrop Ames in Massachusetts where the Langwater strain was developed.

From the herds of Queen Anne's Centreville. County, where interest in fine blood lines and careful breeding is high, there will always be the possibility of a new strain of Guernseys being developed. The number of animals which have already displayed an accepted superiority of some sort offer a chance for chain breeding from which anything may happen. The same possibility exists in other herds on the Eastern Shore. If this should occur in Queen Anne's the roots will be traced first to the introduction of a fine strain through four young bulls, and the subsequent establishment of larger herd establishments qualified to project breeding to its highest plane.




