Nesting Study Of Wild Fowl In Far North

Biological Survey To Place 3 Observers Above Arctic Circle

Broadening its endeavors in studying the comings and goings of wildfowl, the Biological Survey of the United States Department of Ariculture expect to have three biologists at work this summer in widely separated regions north of the Arctic Circle investigating nesting conditions of wild ducks and geese. Meantime other investigators of the Survey will be covering nesting

areas farther south. One Biologist, Charles E. Gillham, after reaching Fort McMurray, Alberta, plans to go by plane in a northeasterly direction to the Arctic coast. Waterfowl investigations have never been made in this region, and Mr. Gillham believes it may contain the nesting grounds of the Ross' snow goose—the only species of North American Waterfwol whose nest has never been found.

Arctic expedition of Comdr. Donald B. MacMillan and on reaching the Labrador Peninsula and Baffin Island will study the Atlantic brant on its nesting grounds.
