The inside walls aer paneled with a soft grey insulating material with cream ceilings of the same material, a treatment throughout planned to give a maximum of protection against weather, adding to comfort against the cold in winter and the heat in summer.

The structure is heated by a central plant, an oil-burning, hot water system using the mono-flow type of installation. An autostat keeps the water in the boiler at 160 degrees and when a thermostat sends notice of coolness in any part of the building, a pump kicks on and hot water immediately flows through the system, giving almost instant warmth.

Two furniture display rooms have been provided, that on the lower floor devoted to modern furniture, with the one on the upper floor, slightly smaller, assigned to floor coverings and antique articles. A workshop is also arranged on the upper floor where finishing and repairing may be done.

The western half of the building contains the funeral service department. On the lower floor is a commodious chapel which opens into the slumber room. Directly behind is the preparatory room while beside it is the garage.

The Chapel has been carefully designed to give an atmosphere of quiet dignity and refinement. It has a seating capacity of a hundred. The grey paneled walls and cream ceiling are enhanced by the warm burgundy tones of the rugs and the curtains to the slumber room and soft lighting effects have been provided. Since there is no additional cost for its use it is expected to be of convenience in holding funeral services, especially in inclement weather, or when the deceased is not a member of a local church.

The slumber room opens into the chapel but may be separated by drawing curtains. This room and the preparatory room were planned to encourage the bringing of patients to the establishment for preparation rather than having these duties performed at the home. Operating in the home is often most difficult under the most favorable conditions and the preparatory room with its modern equipment has been found most satisfactory.

After preparation the patient is dressed in proper slumber robes and placed on a silk-robed day bed in the slumber room. After a casket has been selected the patient is dressed, placed in the casket and transferred to his home unless the family desires that it remain in the slumber room with services to be held in the Chapel.

The casket display room is on the second floor and is comfortably arranged so that members of a family may be unhurried in their selection of a casket. Construction of the funeral home and furniture parlors was handled by Paul W. Phillips of Sudlersville.
