Summers was charged with shooting and killing Joseph Brown in the Narrows "sandwich" fatality when Brown was said to have asked Summers for a sandwich and received a bullet instead. Pollard was accused of killing Edward Butler following a crap game in a Church Hill dwelling house. Puckett, a white youth, was presented in connection with the death of Ruth Bowers near Chestertown.
