Herd Exceeds 40-Pound Butterfat Mark. Harrison Alderneys Second

Purebred and grade Guernseys from the Spencer's Landing farm of Allan B. Lane held the lead in both the individual and herd figures for the December tests of the Queen Anne's Dairy Herd Improvement Association with Alderneys from the Land's End herd of H. N. and M. B. Harrison runners-up in each compilation, according to summaries furnished by Wilbur H. Morris, tester for the association.

## Most Farm Fires Have Preventable Causes

Farm fires in the United States take about 3,500 lives and destroy \$100,000,-000 worth of property each year, says a recent United States Department of publication "Fires on Agriulture Farms."

Eighty-five percent of this loss is from such commonplace causes as defective chimneys and flues; sparks on combustible roofs; lightning; spontaneous combustion; careless use of matches, smoking; careless use of gasoline and kerosene; defective and improperly installed stoves and furnaces; faulty wiring; and misuse of electric appliances.

Four simple precautions that the author, Harry E. Roethe, of the Bureau of Chemistry and Soils, gives to reduce needless waste caused by farm fires are: Use fire-resistant roofing, dispose of waste and rubbish, never use gasoline or kerosene to start or revive a fire, and, guard against overheating of stoves and furnaces and clean smoke pipes at least once a year. He also suggests that major buildings be equipped with lightning rods.

In addition to removing the fire hazard, Roethe suggests preparations to fight a fire should one occur, that is, fire-fighting equipment on every farm, kept in a handy place ready for instant


