### December Set Up Dry Record

Moisture Least For Month Since 1896

The weather recount for December in Maryland was cooler than normal and very, very dry. In fact State Meteorologist John W. Weeks had to go back forty-one years clear out of the Twentieth Century to 1896 to find a December with a lower precipitation combined rainfall and snowfall-equal to the month just vanished. Even the amount of sunshine was below normal.


