

DEPOSITION

On this 1st day of February, 1898, at
Baltimore, county of
State of Md., before me, R. H. Lockwood, a
special examiner of the Bureau of Pensions, personally appeared
William Hampton, who, being by me first duly sworn to
answer truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this special
examination of aforesaid claim for pension, deposes and says: That his
age is 56 years; post-office address, 1128 Comet st
this city; occupation, laborer.

I enlisted in Co K. 9. U. S. C. I. in the
fall 1863. I was discharged after serving
about 2 years at Brownsville Texas.

I knew this soldier he was orderly Serjt
of my company. didn't know him before
going into the service. I know of his being
sick and going to or Pease of our regiment
for medicine, but don't know of his ever
being abled to go to the hospital. at the
time of going into the service he was not our
orderly, he was made so at Ft. Davis I think,
took Edward Shields place from that
time till I left the regt he was acting as
orderly Serjt. don't know of his being away
from duty. I never noticed any thing queer
about his actions at any time while I was
with him. never saw him take any liquor.
he was a very steady kind of a man. he
appeared to less, was not a gambler or any
vicious habits of any kind. was very kind
to every body. he was a very quiet, kind
and good natured. I never saw or heard
about him since I was discharged in Texas.
He had two other brothers in same company
by Name of Wm & Moses. William got ^{at Ft. Quitman} killed,
and Moses lived to come home. This is all I
know regarding him. he might have become sick
