I knew this soldier Joseph Shipley before  
he went into the service. I never knew of  
his having any sickness of any kind  
before going into the army. There were three  
brothers of them enlisted at same time, named  
Moses, Joseph & William. The latter was killed.  
Joseph showed no signs of weakness of mind  
before he went into the service. I knew the  
whole family, the father & mother are dead  
there is a sister Sarah living here. There  
is no sign of weakness of the mind of any of  
the other members of soldier's family that I have  
ever seen any evidences of and I have been  
intimate with them all the days of my life  
was raised with them. I never saw the soldier  
from the time he enlisted till his return & then  
it was within a week of his return.

I saw there was a change in his mind from  
the very first I saw him. It showed itself  
he kept going over the war scenes - drilling  
and shooting - did not act wild at this time.

He went to the country to work soon after  
his return - for about two years before he  
returned here to his family. I think he was  
wild at times while he was working round  
and was arrested & put in charge before  
his return here. I never knew of any Special
