On this *8* day of *February*, 1898, at
Baltimore, county of
 State of *MD*, before me, *H. H. Lockwood*, a
 special examiner of the Bureau of Pensions, personally appeared

Sandy Moore, who, being by me first duly sworn to
 answer truly all interrogatories propounded to him during this special
 examination of aforesaid claim for pension, deposes and says: That his
 age is *57* years; post-office address, *417 Dover St*
this city; occupation, *labourer*.

I enlisted in *Co K 9th SC 7* in the
 fall of 1863 and served till 1866.

I remember *Joseph Shipley* as orderly
 sergeant of my company. I was with the
 company most of the time during my term
 of service, excepting while I was disabled
 which was about 60 days. I did not
 know him before service. on first knowing
 him he appeared a well hearty man.

I know of his brother *William* being killed
 at deep bottom va. He had another brother
Moses in same company. I did not know
 of his ^{*Joseph*} being sick during service. he attended
 to his duties of orderly to the end of the
 service. have never seen him since discharge.
 I heard he went crazy. he never showed
 any signs of being crazy during service. so
 far as I know. I never knew of his being
 a drinking man for a soldier could not
 get it, as I did not know if he would have
 used it if he could have got it. he was a kind
 orderly & I dont think the boys had any
 trouble getting along with him. he was with
 us up to time of discharge. I did not see any
 signs of his mind being diseased or weak while
 in the service.
