directly to Quebec instead of stopping at Halifax |
| 26 Feb 1814 | Griffith to ? | Re progress of large American ships L. Ontario
sent by a letter from US Secretary Pady
of the Lake Sackett's Harbour March 4 1814 |
| 5 March 1814 | Geo. Warren | Progress of Americans on L. Ontario so rapid
and great he does not believe he can match them.
Pledges never to surrender under <u>any</u>
circumstances. Includes a <u>tabular</u>
<u>comparison</u> of British and US Fleets,
plus detailed description of US ships
and plan for fleet on Lake Champlain. |

| 7 March 1814 | Prevost - Warren | requesting 30 32 pdr carronades &
30 24 pdr long guns be sent from Halifax to
Quebec to outfit ships & gunboats building. |
| 10 March 1814 | Prevost - Warren | wishing that 32 pdr long guns be
substituted for above 24 pdrs since Americans are
mounting 38 32 pdr long and 32 42 pdr carronades. |
| 8 March 1814 | Warren | List of ships under his command.
- List under Griffith and locations. |
| 8 March 1814 | Cochrane - Warren | referring to need of barracks to permit
black & refugees to be landed therein temporarily in
order to transship them from US to British colonies |
