 his position being turned he
 retreated to Fort George, and the
 American Army advanced to
 Queenstown. — In this situation
 it remained for nearly three weeks
 occasionally making a demonstration
 of attacking the Forts but evidently
 waiting for the co-operation of the
 Fleet from Sackett's Harbour —
 this time the possession by the Army
 of Queenstown and St. David's was
 a force far superior to any that
 we could oppose to it enabled
