FIRST RURAL ROUTE BIRTHDAY PLANNED

Fred S. Russell, of Chestertown, chairman of the committee arranging for the celebration of the establishment, May 1, 1900, of the first rural route on the Eastern Shore at Millington, on Decoration Day, is preparing an elaborate program. Decoration Day has been selected because of the fact that it is a holiday and is more convenient for members of the service from all the peninsula to attend.

The ceremonies will begin at 1.30 in the afternoon with a parade in which civilians, members of the service and fire companies, with one or more bands of music, will participate.

W. Irving Walker, former Legislatureman from Queen Anne's county who was largely responsible for the establishment of the route at Millington, will read a history of the establishment and development of the service throughout the Shore.

Norman A. Wallen, the first person to operate the route and who is still in the service, will have a conspicuous part in the program.

The evening events include a banquet in the Community Fire Company's Hall in Millington, at which the following will speak: W. Floyd Conroy, of New York, chairman of the executive committee of the National Letter Carriers' Association; Congressman T. Alan Goldsborough, Harvey, J. Hill, promoter of the Del-Mar-Va Eastern Shore Development Association; Postal Inspector W. A. Sommers, of Wilmington, and Postmaster Stevens, of Millington.

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
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
