Here are some of the outstanding items on the scientific record of 1927. Civilian aviators in America flew more than 12,000,000 miles. Naval survey mapped whole territory of Alaska in 15 days. Medical scientists discover malaria will cure paresis. Radio developed transatlantic telephony, beam transmission, television and other new steps. Many exploration trips made to all parts of the globe by American scientists.

Thirteen of America's greatest girl swimmers have sailed for Bermuda where they will participate in two meets before returning on January 9. Twelve of the girls making the trip are members of the Women's Swimming Association of New York, while the other is Miss Ethel Lackie, of Chicago, the world premier sprint swimmer among the women. Included in the party are Miss Martha Norelius, the outstanding figure in the aquatic sport today, and Miss Helen Meany, the queen of fancy divers. Others in the group are: Eleanor Holm, thirteen years old and holder of the national medley record; Catherine Ames, Doris O'Mara, Agnes Geraghty, the premier breaststroke swimmer; Kathryn Brown, Ethel McGary, national long distance champion and record holder; Lisa Lindstrom, Eileen O'Mara, Elaine Delany and Adelaide Lambert, of Chestertown, the all-around champion.

THOMAS SUDLER DIES

Thomas Sudler, aged 84 years, one of Queen Anne's County's most highly respected citizens, and for many years a well known merchant died at the home of his niece, Mrs. Clara Spry, in Church Hill, Tuesday morning. Death was due to a stroke of paralysis which he suffered Monday. The deceased was a life long resident of Queen Anne's County, and was a son of the late Joseph Sudler. Many of his relatives were engaged in the business at Rock Hall at one time conducted by Catlin's Corner. Following the death of his wife several years ago he made his home with his niece, and continued to reside there until his death. He is only near surviving relatives Mrs. Spry, and four nephews: Joseph Baxter, A. Sudler Baxter and Charles Baxter, of this county, and Frank Baxter, of Kent County.

SAID BIBLE FORESAW FALL OF HOLY CITY REWARDED

Wilbur W. Hubbard, Chestertown, is the recipient of an autographed photograph of General Allenby, conqueror of Jerusalem during the World War, together with a letter from the famous commander.

The gift resulted from a conversation Mr. Hubbard had with friends of the British general, in which he called their attention to a Biblical prophecy which describes the manner in which the Holy City was to be taken. Mr. Hubbard recalled at the time that when the British and Allied forces entered the city, a fleet of Allied aeroplanes hovered over the center of the town, and that the conquering forces entered without a shot being fired and without resistance on the part of the inhabitants.

Mr. Hubbard pointed to Isaiah's 31st chapter and fifth verse, in which it is declared that "As birds flying, so will the Lord of hosts defend Jerusalem; defending also he will deliver it; and passing over he will preserve it."

The friends of the general immediately communicated with him and quoted the interesting prophecy, emphasizing the fact that the aircraft, "as birds flying," really were responsible for the peaceful entrance into the city, which preserved the place from destruction.

General Allenby, at once replied and sent a letter and his photograph to Mr. Hubbard.

MAKE A HOME BUDGET

There are a very few successful enterprises in the business world that are conducted in the hit and miss, haphazard manner in which the home expenses are handled. If a budget of the house hold expenses is prepared at the beginning of the year, taking into consideration the probable income, and consistently adhered to there would be less difficulty in making both ends meet. Such a budget should be drawn up to include all the necessities and some of the desirable purchases your family hopes to make within the expected income for 1928. Food housing, clothing, and running expenses will be among the essentials. Personal expenses for each member of the family must be allowed, and fixed expenses such as insurance premiums or taxes must be met. More or less problematical is the question of new furnishing or equipment, or the amount that must go to doctors and dentist, and consequently the amount that can be saved.

A good budget is one that takes all these points into consideration and keeps the definitely known expenses well within the anticipated income leaving a fair-sized margin for the uncertain item and for emergencies. After making the budget on a yearly basis, it is helpful to plan for each month separately and in advance, so that as expenditures are made they can be compared with the original estimate in each category. Sometimes it becomes evident that a larger allotment must be made in one field, or that less would do in another, and corresponding changes can be made in the yearly and monthly plans.

NEW AGRICULTURAL ACHIEVEMENT

While it has long been known that poultry raising on the Del-Mar-Va peninsula was profitable, if conducted according to approved methods, it remained for last year to demonstrate the almost unbelievable possibilities in raising the most valuable local poultry product—the turkey. According to a canvass made at Chestertown, 60 tons of turkeys were shipped from that locality to the city markets driving the past Christmas season, netting the farmers upwards of \$67,000. As it is reasonable to believe that at least 40 tons were shipped from other parts of the peninsula the total yield in money must have exceeded \$100,000.

Although it takes many months to raise a turkey, and extra care and expense are involved, the result obtained last year seems to fully justify the effort. This is in line with the generally accepted theory that variety in farming is warranted where it is possible to have variety. It also indicates that conditions on the peninsula are favorable for turkey raising, which at one time was doubted.

The strategic position of the peninsula, with regard to the great eastern markets gives it an advantage over the South and West, which has been relied upon to a large extent heretofore.—Every Evening, January 2, 1928.

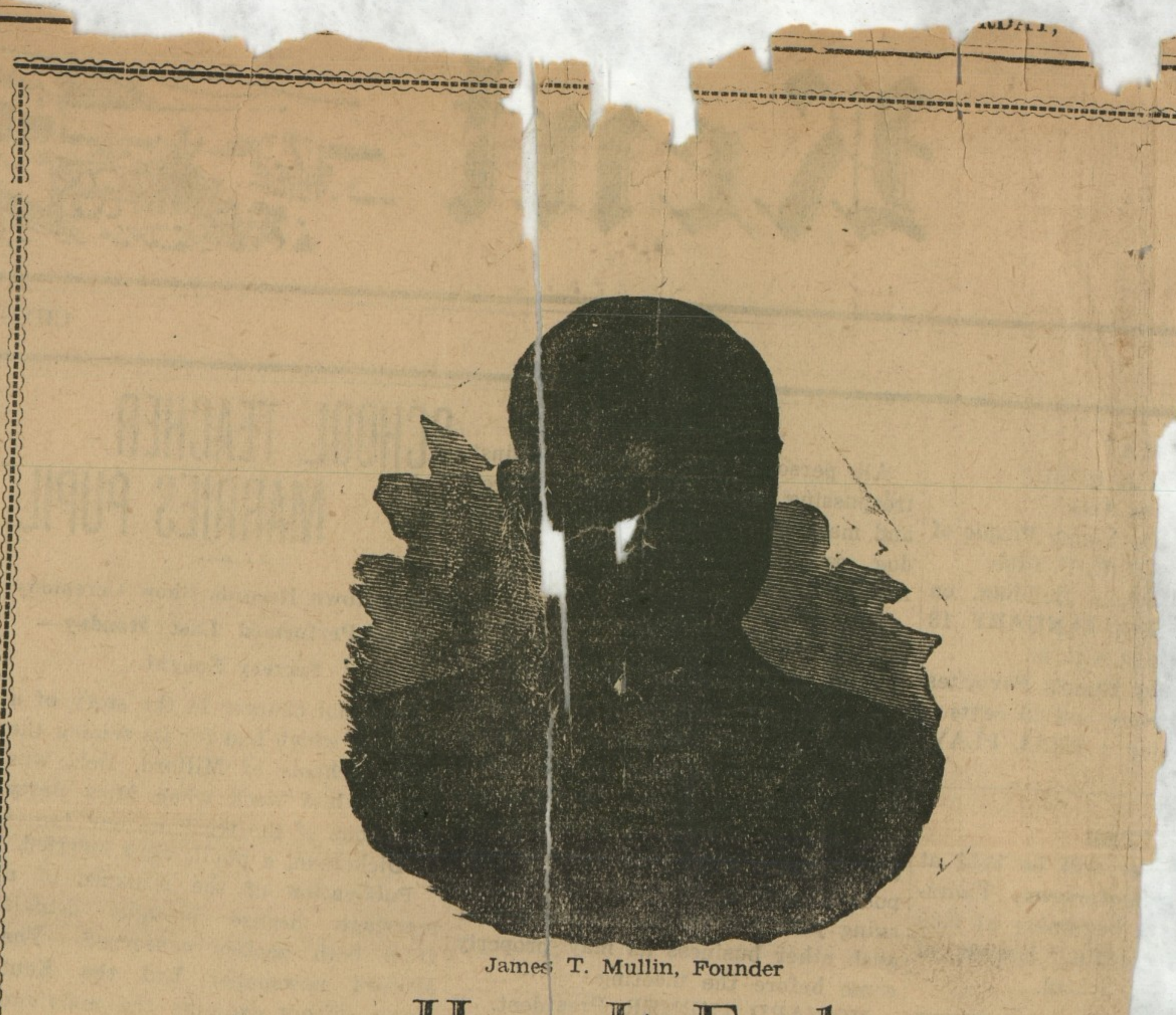
