Dimpfel Case Compromised.

At a conference of the lawyers representing their clients with Associate Judge Adkins in Easton last Friday, the celebrated Dimpfel case was compromised. A decree was passed annulling the legality of the marriage, and Mr. Boyer Lusby is now in possession of the property. The case has been in one court or another for the past two years, and grew out of the marriage of Mr. Dimpfel, who was divorced by the courts of New York, with forfeiture of the right to remarry. It was from the union that Miss Maria was born, and her attorneys held that she was the legal heir to the Dimpfel fortune. The settlement of the case is regarded as a victory for the plaintiff, who has been ably represented by Wm. H. Cooper, Esq., of Wilmington, Harrison W. Vickers, Esq., and son, Harrison W. Vickers, Jr., Esq., of Chestertown. The costs, however, amounting to between \$400 and \$500, will be paid by the plaintiff according to the decree of the court.

RELIGIOUS MATTERS.

Appointing district superintendents to succeed Rev. W. C. Koons of the Easton district and Rev. Adam Stengle of the Salisbury district, whose terms expire by limitation, will be features of the next annual session of the Wilmington M. E. Conference, which will be held in Milford eight months hence. Rev. Frank F. Carpenter and Rev. S. N. Pilehard of Wilmington are suggested for the Easton district superintendency as is also Rev. George P. Jones of Middletown. Appointing Rev. Robt. Wait, of Smyrna, superintendent of the Asbury Church, Smyrna, are regarded as possibilities. For the Salisbury district, superintendency, Rev. T. E. Martindale, of Salisbury and Rev. C. W. Prettyman of Snow Hill, are suggested. The terms of Rev. A. S. Mowbray and Rev. S. M. Morgan, superintendents of the Wilmington and Dover districts, respectively, will expire in March, 1910. Rev. R. K. Stephenson and Rev. C. T. Wyatt are mentioned for the Wilmington district superintendency on the expiration of Dr. Mowbray's term.
