Democratic Ticket.

The morning after was somewhat chilly for both sides, though it warmed up a bit towards the middle of the day.

JUST think of it, there will be no more politics in Kent county for two whole years. What is going to become of us?

THE people of Kent county endorsed the 94 cent tax rate by nominating the Anti candidates for County Commissioners and County Treasurer.

IT is reported that the Organization paid from \$20 to \$25 a day for automobiles to bring voters to the polls, and in some cases paid \$20 extra to the chauffeurs for running these cars.

THE Transcript will give its support to the ticket that was nominated on Monday, and we are sure that every Anti-Organization man in Kent county will do likewise.

AS THE old fellow said, the ticket is part your'n, and it's part our'n, and what's mine is your'n, and what's your'n is mine, and let's see that the whole thing is our'n after the election.

THE Anti-Organization carried the Second, Third, Sixth and Seventh Districts and the Galena precinct in the First District for nearly every one of their candidates, and yet lost a part of their ticket.

KENT COUNTY is overwhelmingly Anti-Organization under normal conditions. Give us a straight, square fight, and keep Republicans out of Democratic contests, and the Organization will never know they are running.

THE Democratic State Convention will be held in the Auditorium Theatre Baltimore, on Tuesday, September 16th, at 12 o'clock. The convention will elect the chairman of the State Central Committee, and as the Organization will control the convention, they will probably re-elect General Murray Vandiver.

THE figures in the Fifth District show that the Organization out every candidate on their ticket in order to save Turner and Shallcross, and yet notwithstanding the reported lavish use of money by the Organization and the voting of some 42 Republicans, the Antis carried the district for their whole ticket except Harris and Kibler.

NOW that Mr. Anderson has gotten what he wanted out of the primaries in Kent, and the preachers have gotten theirs and the Republicans are satisfied and the Antis and the Organization have divided the honors, Senator John Walter Smith should feel perfectly sure that his influence was used as directed. It required it all to get what they got.

THE victory of William H. McKee as a member of the State Central Committee is a strong evidence of his wide popularity and his ability as a vote getter. Mr. McKee will prove of much service to his faction on the committee, and while his business in Kent will be to "sit up and take notice" of what the other fellows do, he will be in a position to know what is done, and will be of much importance to the Antis.

THE Anti-Organization conducted a straight, clean and fair fight in the primaries on Monday, and their showing in the result in the face of the tremendous odds against them show their fighting qualities. They had to fight not only the Organization Democrats, but any number of Republicans were voted in the primaries, and besides Senator Smith's "influence" leaned strongly towards the Organization.

HAD the Organization forces remained as true to Mr. John P. Ahern as he proved true to the Organization, there may have been a different story to tell. That Mr. Ahern was traded by the Organization for votes for some other candidate is shown by the vote of the Organization candidates received in the Fifth District. Turner beat Harris 21 votes in the Fifth, while Caldwell beat Ahern 3. In the second also the Organization slaughtered Ahern, where Caldwell won by a majority of 67.

THE result of the primary election in Kent county proves one thing above all others, and that is that the people demand that this county's finances shall remain in the hands of the Anti-Organization, as witness the nomination of Samuel G. Caldwell for County Treasurer, and T. Benjamin Crew and John C. Wood for County Commissioners. And be it said in all modesty, yet with absolute sincerity that the nomination of these candidates is an endorsement of the fight which the TRANSCRIPT made for the tax-payers.

WHENEVER an Anti-Organization man meets Mr. Samuel G. Caldwell, of Galena, we advise him to take off his hat and say, "Well done, good and faithful servant;" and whenever an Organization man meets Mr. John P. Ahern, we advise him to go through the same performance, because the service which each gentleman rendered to his faction in the primary on Monday was so conspicuous and helpful, that each faction would have been wondering yet how it all happened had it not been for the achievements of each. The TRANSCRIPT leads the way in taking off his hat.

MAYOR GAYNOR, of New York, died on ship board while crossing the ocean on Thursday. He was sitting in a chair and expired from heart failure after giving orders for luncheon. The Mayor's death is a severe blow to Tammany Hall's ticket in the coming Mayoralty fight, as the Mayor was a candidate in a three-cornered fight, which would probably have meant the success of Tammany's ticket. The TRANSCRIPT received the news of Mayor Gaynor's death direct by wire from New York on Thursday afternoon, and was the first to bulletin his death.

SIGNIFICANT REMARK. A gentleman remarked on the streets on the morning after the primaries—"I think the Antis made a most remarkable showing in the primary on Monday, when you consider what and who they had to fight. When you remember that practically single handed, they had to fight the Organization Democrats, who were assisted by Senator John Walter Smith, William H. Anderson, the Urie Republicans and many of the ministers in the town and county, and then to come out of the fight with four men on their ticket nominated, it is one of the most remarkable victories I ever heard of, and in my judgment the Anti-Organization sentiment in this county is so overwhelming that only such procedure as we witnessed on our streets here all day Monday can defeat them. I believe the Antis will be stronger in the next fight than ever, and they will win two years hence because of the way they were defeated this time."

INTERESTING FIGURES.

An analysis of the figures in the primaries held on Monday is interesting. For instance, in the Millington precinct, where Mr. John P. Ahern made such a gallant fight and really nominated those Organization candidates who won, though he was slaughtered elsewhere by the Organization, the vote for Mr. Ahern on Monday was 166 and for Mr. Caldwell 84. Two years ago in the Jones-Hurlock contest, Mr. Jones received 113 votes, while Mr. Hurlock received 85 votes, and Mr. Ahern was behind Mr. Hurlock. This shows that there were 53 more votes polled in the Millington precinct on Monday than there were in the contest two years ago. Where did they come from? In the contest on Monday Mr. Charles L. Dodd, the "high man" of the Organization ticket received 1,288 votes, while two years ago, when he was their high man, he received only 1,114—a difference of 174 in Mr. Dodd's vote. Where did they come from? Now if you take Mr. Kibler's total vote of 1,183 and add to it the vote Mr. Howard Turner, which was 1,247 votes, you will find that the total number who voted in the primaries on Monday was 2,430 as against 2,177 in the bruising Foxwell-Beck contest two years ago—a difference of 253 votes. Where in the world did they come from? Another interesting thing about the figures is the remarkable uniformity in the vote of the Anti-Organization ticket, whose totals vary from 1,117 to 1,198, with the exception of Mr. Samuel G. Caldwell, whose vote was 1,234. Interesting isn't it?

INCIDENTS OF THE ELECTION.

IT is said that as much as \$25 a vote was paid by the Organization in the Fifth District for votes, \$15 in the Sixth, \$10 in the Fourth and from \$15 to \$25 in the First. The Antis hadn't a look in. The vote that Mr. Robert J. McWhorter received for sheriff was a splendid compliment to the worthy young man, especially as Mr. McWhorter had only six weeks in which to make his campaign, while his opponent had several months' start. A change of 37 votes would have made Mr. McWhorter a winner, and all things considered Mr. McWhorter made a remarkable showing.

WE are requested by Messrs. Samuel G. Caldwell, T. Benj. Crew, John C. Wood and Wm. H. McKee, winners, as well as those candidates on the Anti-Organization ticket who were defeated in the primaries to extend their sincere thanks to all their Anti-Organization and Organization friends who voted for them in the recent primaries and did what they could for whatever service was rendered in their behalf. The vote among the candidates for commissioners was exceedingly close. There was a difference of only four votes between the totals of Messrs. Crew, Wood and Thompson before the official returns were received. The official count gave Thompson one less vote and Wood one more vote and the final vote was Crew 1,198, Taylor 1,185, Thompson 1,198 and Wood 1,199.

THE Organization forces accused the Antis of sending out a number of marked tickets to fool the voters, but there was no evidence to show that such a thing was done. A pitiable sight was witnessed in Millington during the voting. Two voters, one paralyzed and totally blind and the other paralyzed and unable to help himself are reported to have been brought to the polls by Organization workers and voted.

IT is said that 42 Republicans affiliated and voted in the Democratic primaries on Monday at Rock Hall and everyone of them voted the Organization ticket, and it is reported from Edesville precinct that the Organization faction voted Republicans and Prohibitionists and spent money like water.

RESULT OF PRIMARIES A DRAW.

The Democratic Ticket in Kent Divided Between Both Factions of the Party After a Scorching Campaign.

NOMINATION EQUIVALENT TO AN ELECTION.

Wilson Democrats Make Many Inroads Into the Organization Ranks.—Signs of the Times Point to Change in Management of State Democracy.

RESULTS ELSEWHERE.—INCIDENTS OF THE DAY.

After one of the bitterest factional contests ever waged in this county both factions emerged from the great battle on Monday with a part of the ticket dangling to their belts. So far as State politics is concerned the Organization forces got the best of the result, while the Antis remain in control of the county finances, and get one member of the State Central Committee. The hardest fight of the contest centered around the candidates for the Legislature, and it was here that the Organization carried both their candidates across the line a winner by majorities ranging from 35 to 73. It is needless to say that the result of the primaries was a big surprise to both factions. The Antis felt confident of success for every man on their ticket because a canvass of the county had convinced them that the sentiment of what is known in politics as the straight vote was overwhelming in favor of the Antis. The Organization were equally as confident of success, evidently because of the confidence they had in another element of the voters and the strenuous efforts they used in securing that vote. When the ballots were counted and the result was known you may imagine the surprise of each faction when it was learned that neither got the entire ticket. Many things entered into the final result. Some believe that the temperance question cut considerable figure; others believe that the tax rate was the cause of the Organization's defeat, while many others believe that money was used to carry the day for the Organization. The result shows that the largest vote in the history of the county was polled on Monday, 459 more votes being polled than in the primary of last year when the Antis nominated every candidate on their ticket. The slump in the Fifth District was the biggest surprise to the Antis, because the Fifth under normal conditions is safely Anti, while in the First, the result in Galena was such a surprise to the Organization that they have not recovered from it yet. The Anti-Organization carried the Second, Third, Fifth, Sixth and Seventh Districts, and the Galena precinct of the First District, while the Organization carried only the First and the Fourth, getting the Millington precinct of the First by an adnormal majority. So far as the control of the party organization is concerned for the next two years, the Organization will be in command. The Antis are not dismayed by any means, because they feel that in the face of the terrible odds against them they have won a great victory. The result in the county by official vote was as follows:

RESULTS ELSEWHERE.

The result of the primaries throughout the State is an object lesson to the Organization such as will give them much concern in the future. Whenever there was a contest the Wilson Democrats either won a signal victory or made such a fine showing as to cause much anxiety to the machine forces. Here are some of the results:

In Baltimore city the Progressives led by George N. Numsen nominated Thomas McNulty for Sheriff and elected two members of the State Central Committee. In Montgomery county State Senator Blair Lee swept the county by a majority of 800, giving the Organization led by the Peters brothers a crushing defeat.

James Archer, Wilson Democrat, defeated Preston, Organization, for the State Senate by 329, and carried the entire Anti-Organization ticket with him in Harford.

In Cecil county, the Anti-Organization led by Byron Bouchelle, for State Senator, defeated the Crothers organization, nominating every candidate save one. In Queen Annes county, John E. George got a severe shock, losing control of the Board of County Commissioners, the Sheriff, Register of Wills, and one member of the State Central Committee. A funny thing about this contest was that W. Irving Walker, James Newman and John Smith, all candidates for County Commissioners and identified by proximity with Chestertown were defeated.

In Washington county the Progressives won, while in Frederick and Alleghany they split even with the Organization.

As a result of the first real skirmish between the Wilson Democrats and the Smith-Mahon Machine, the former made a remarkable showing and will have 55 delegates in the State Convention on Wednesday as compared with 75 for the Organization. Joshua Miles won the fight in Somerset and seems to be more strongly entrenched than before. Congressman Covington had no trouble in Talbot, nor did Smith in Caroline, though the Wilson Democrats, led by Henry Lewis, made a strong fight. The future looks bright for the Wilson Democrats, and if they will effect permanent organizations in Baltimore city and every county in the State, they will secure control of the State Organization before President Wilson's term expires.

ORGANIZATION LOSING GROUND.

The result of the primaries throughout the State on Monday indicates that there is a beginning of the disintegration of the State Organization and that a new order of things in accord with the principles of President Wilson, is about to arise in Maryland. Senator Blair Lee's great victory in Montgomery county and the triumph of his friends in nearly every county where there was a contest, the notable exception being Kent county, places the Senator in a most strategic position in the politics of the State, and will eventually result in his ascendancy to the party leadership in the State. The result throughout the State shows that the Antis have dealt the Organization a body blow in Baltimore city; they carried Harford, Montgomery and Cecil counties, got big slices of the tickets in Kent and Queen Annes, and carried the day in Somerset, where Joshua W. Miles, the veteran leader of the county, won by a majority of something like 200. Johnny George was given a severe setback in Queen Annes, where he lost control of the County Commissioners, Register of Wills, Sheriff and one member of the State Central Committee, though he retains control of the latter. In Cecil the Anti-Organization forces elected Byron Bouchelle State Senator and the rest of their ticket by comfortable majorities and the Crothers faction was defeated. In Baltimore city, the Antis elected McNulty Sheriff, and two members of the State Central Committee, and gave the Organization the first real jolt it has had for years. So the Signs of the Times still point to progress, and there is coming a day when the Democratic party will be in the hands of new leaders in this State, and unless we read these signs incorrectly the day is not far in the distance.
