



Historic Tom Hyer And Yankee Sullivan Fight Of Rock Point in 1849.

Among a number of valuable sporting records owned by Mr. John J. Mahon he has a large colored picture of the great fight between Tom Hyer and Yankee E. S. STUBBS Sullivan, which took place February 17, 1849, at Rock Point, Worton. This picture was presented to Mr. Mahon by Hon. Marion deK. Smith, together with the staple which held the rope drawn mar15. from the old sycamore tree by ex Sheriff Plummer before the tree was cut down. The fight was won by Hyer in 16 rounds in 17 minutes and 18 seconds. The

battle was for \$5,000 a side. A few months before the fight Sullivan and Hyer had a rough-and-tumble scramble in Hyer's barroom in New York, and Hyer was the winner, Sullivan having Special attention given to the sale of been imbibing rather freely at the time. > This battle was long before the late John L. Sulliyan made fights with boxing gloves so popular. Hyer and Yankee Sullivan fought with bare knuckles, according to London prize ring rules. When they arrived in the ring hot bricks were put under the fighters' feet. Hyer stood 6 feet 1 inch and weighed 180 pounds. Sullivan was 5 feet 9\frac4 inches tall and weighed 156 pounds.

Sullivan was shaky on his legs in the fifteenth. Hyer forced him to the ropes and wrenched Sullivan's left arm rendering it useless. Round 16.—Hyer rushed Sullivan, threw and fell on him. When the


