

## Jones's Town Entries

N<sup>o</sup> 17 August 20. 1733 Then Capt. John Boreing one of the Com<sup>rs</sup> for Jones's Town took up a Lott in said Town N<sup>o</sup> 17. for himself and Paid the Clerks fee for entering the same
- X  
N<sup>o</sup> 18 On the same day vizt. August 20. 1733 Capt John Boreing took up a Lott in Jones's Town N<sup>o</sup> 18. for his Son John Boreing Jun<sup>r</sup> and paid the Clerks Fee for entering the same
- X  
N<sup>o</sup> 7 September 2. 1733 Then Capt. John Cockey one of the Commissioners for Jones's Town took up a Lott in said Town N<sup>o</sup> 7

N<sup>o</sup> 17  
18 February 15. 1734 $\frac{1}{2}$  Then Capt John Boreing one of the Commissioners for Jones's Town having neglected to Build upon two Lotts in said Town N<sup>o</sup> 17 & 18. which he had taken up formerly vizt<sup>t</sup> on the 20 day of August 1733, took up the said two Lotts a Second time, according to the same intent, and for the same purpose as formerly, and paid the Clerks fees for the same

N<sup>o</sup> 3 February 19. 1734 $\frac{1}{2}$  Then Capt John Cockey who informed me that the Heirs or Executors of Capt John Cromwell (who on the 13<sup>th</sup> day of August 1733 took up a Lott in Jones's Town N<sup>o</sup> 3) had not built a House large enough to Secure the said Lott, according to the Act of Assembly, and desired to take up the said Lott N<sup>o</sup> 3 on his Son William Cockey's Name, and for his use, and paid the Fees for the same —

N<sup>o</sup> 7 February 19. 1734 $\frac{1}{2}$  Then Capt John Cockey having elapsed the time of Building a House on his Lott in Jones's Town N<sup>o</sup> 7 desired the said Lott N<sup>o</sup> 7 might be entered in his own Name, and paid the Clerks Fee for the same.
