

3 - Buildings Needed:

- (a) - Erect a building to properly display small native and tropical birds. This must be a heated building.
- (b) - Erect a building for the year-round display of small mammals. This must be a heated building.

4 - Flying Cage (Two Compartments).

This cage should be used for Eagles, Hawks, or other rapacious birds. It is not suitable for pheasants.

5 - Do not install a display of Rabbits.

6 - Existing Central Building. (Camel House)

This building should be remodeled for the exhibition of camels, llamas and/or other hooped stock.

7 - Receiving and Quarantine Building.

A building should be added, where new animals could be uncrated, and housed, until the Veterinarian has had opportunity for a thorough inspection, and quarantine against disease.

8 - Baltimore Zoological Society.

Mr. Gordon urges the early formation of such a Society.

It was the consensus of the Board to turn the entire report over to the Director so that he could coordinate it with funds available for improvements of the Zoo, and for consultation with Mr. Felix A. Leser, former Baltimore Zoo Director.

The President next introduced a discussion revolving about overlapping dates at the Baltimore Stadium for the 1947 season involving baseball and football. He further stated that he believed that the calling of a joint meeting of all Stadium sponsors for the discussion of the many problems arising out of the proposed events would be beneficial to the Park Board and to the Sports Interests.

The President said that a survey handled by our Engineering Division was recently made by the General Electric Engineer. The President said that one of the major objections of the Navy following the termination of the Orioles baseball season was the position of certain light poles in the end zone at the north end of the Stadium which might interfere with the vision of the spectators. The estimate stated that a new tower to replace the two in question would cost approximately \$11,300.00 with an additional charge of \$15,500.00 for other electrical work in connection with Stadium lighting towers. It was pointed out by the President that the Orioles spend \$4,500.00 a year to move the end zone light towers in and out before and after each baseball season. The President further suggested that the cost of the replacement of the new tower might be paid for partly by the Orioles and partly by the Park Board. Commissioner Hammerman asked where the money would come from to pay for the Park Department's share involving the new lighting. The President replied by saying that the whole matter would have to be reconsidered and worked out with the Orioles and the Navy.

Commissioner Armor asked whether any seat repairs would be forthcoming at the Stadium in 1947. The President said he did not think so, although some bad seating may be condemned by the City Engineers, in which case repairs would then be mandatory. He further stated that the 1947 Park budget showed an item of \$35,000.00 to be used for Stadium repairs.

Commissioner Hammerman said that he would like to have part of the \$35,000.00 spent for repairing the front of the Stadium Administration Building, commenting that this building has been an eyesore for many years, and the improvement of it would be good publicity for the City of Baltimore since visitors and residents see this part of the Stadium first when they arrive to attend a game. He said it would certainly improve the appearance of the approach to the front of the Stadium. The President pointed out that the repairs to the front of the Stadium Building would
