Dear Mr. Harris:

Mr. Scalamandre has referred me to you on the subject of moth-proofing. In 1940 furniture in the Old Senate Chamber in the 18th century State House at Annapolis was upholstered in a cotton-wool fabric furnished by Scalamandre. Curtains of the same crimson "morene" were hung at the windows. The room was closed during the war and we now find that moths have made such inroads upon the upholstery that the hair filling and the material of the chairs will have to be renewed. The curtains can perhaps be cleaned and rehung.

I understand from Mr. Scalamandre that you have worked with Mr. LoNero on similar problems and might be willing to advise us how to avoid a repetition of this trouble.

I was chairman of the Committee of the Maryland Historical Society which was appointed by the State to refurnish the Old Senate Chamber, hence my interest in the matter.
