Detail of Detectives to Depots.

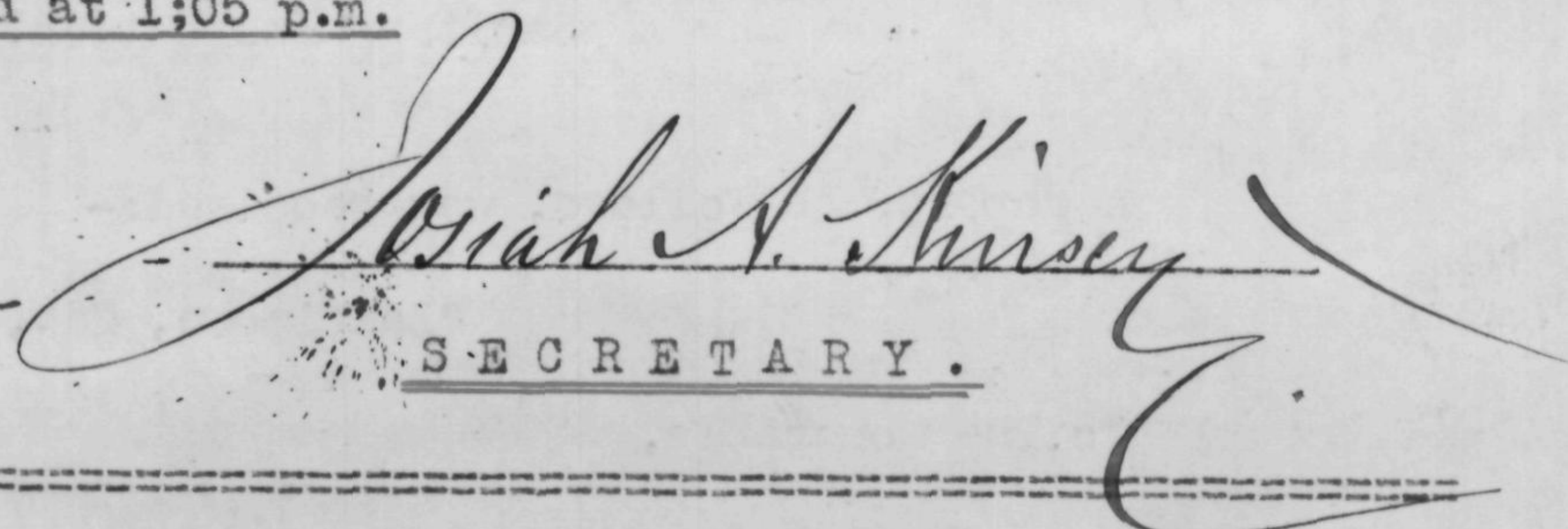
The Marshal was called in before the Board and addressed by the President, as follows:-

"The Board is informed, unofficially, that in view of the fact that Captain A. J. Pumphrey has left the service, criminals from various parts of the country may come to Baltimore to get off some work and the Board thinks it would not be inadvisable to have detectives who know the crooks to be stationed at the several depots and steamboat wharves, where such persons may enter the city. We do not know that there is any real occasion for this, but think that as a precautionary measure it is well to so station the detectives to detect the incoming of outside criminals. You will please make the necessary arrangements for such detailing of members of the Detective Department."
