

Gentlemen:-

In accordance with instructions received from your Honorable Body, I ordered the Captains of the various districts to look into the sanitary condition of all yards and closets within their jurisdiction.

The result of their inspection is herewith appended. It will be noted from quite a number of the reports that there are several yards and closets in an unsanitary condition.

The last general inspection was made the latter part of May and as sometime has elapsed since that inspection I would, respectfully, request authority to order another general inspection and transmit the result to the Commissioner of Health.
