Gentlemen:-

Violations of the Sunday Liquor Law in the several districts, Sunday, July 10, 1910, were as follows:-

Eastern District.....Offs. J.F.Wankmiller, John G.Nitzel and M.F.Frawley, (plain clothes), July 10, 1910, raided saloon of Cecelia Loeffler, 1400 Bank st. Four witnesses and four glasses of beer secured as evidence. Mrs. Loeffler was arrested for selling liq. on Sunday. Robert Kopalski bar-tender, arrested for working on Sunday. Both committed for Court.

Saloon of John Brzozwski, 1637 Eastern ave., on the charge of selling liquor on Sunday. Four men found in the place with a kettle of beer. Case dismissed. Witnesses swore beer did not come from the saloon.
