

Patrolman Roche was acquitted of the first specification and found guilty of the second specification. It was ordered that he be transferred to the Northwestern District and assigned to B. Division and deprived of twenty days' leave of absence.

Patrolman Frank N. Seidl, Southwestern District, was tried upon charge, as follows:-

C h a r g e :

CONDUCT UNBECOMING AN OFFICER:

By disturbing the peace of the neighborhood of his home, 1816 E. Lombard street, about 5 a.m. on the mornings of July 9th., and 10th., 1910, by making loud and unseemly noises. Also with using profane and abusive language towards members of his family to the disturbance of the public peace, on the same mornings.

It appearing from the testimony that the disturbances which occurred at the home of Patrolman Seidl on the mornings of July 9th., and 10th., 1910, arose from charges and counter charges of improper conduct on the part of husband and wife, the case was held over pending the outcome of intended steps on the part of the officer for a separation from his wife; the understanding being that a report shall be made by the officer not later than August 15th., 1910, as to what has been actually done in that direction.

Assignments of Magistrates.

Additional Justice Robert H. Carr to the Northwestern District Station-house, to sit thereat from 9 a.m., July 17,
