Gentlemen:-

Report received from the Central District in connection with violation of the Sunday liquor law, at Charles Lerberto's Lunch Room, 508 E. Pratt street, is as follows:

About 6.10 A.M., July 17, 1910, Patrolman John W. Mc. Kenny reports that he was detailed in plain clothes together with Round Sergeant Thomas Mc. Graw and Patrolman Thomas P. Mc. Guire, to watch for Sunday violations on Pratt street; Patrolman Mc. Kenny went into Lerberto's Lunch Room, 506 East Pratt street and saw him, (Lerberto), let two negroes into his bar and he followed them. He called for a cigar and the negroes called for Beer. They drank about one third of the beer and put it on the bar. Officer Mc. Kenny picked up the beer and said, "Gentlemen, I am an officer; he showed his badge and told them they were under arrest. Charles Lerberto, who drew the beer, made for Mc. Kenny and knocked the beer in his face, hit him over the heart and knocked him down. The officer was speechless for a while not expecting the blow, and before he could get to them the negroes got out of the door on the Gay street side. Lerberto was arrested for selling liquor on Sunday, also for assaulting the officer and was released for Court on \$1,000 bail in each case.
