Saloon Raids.

Report, as follows, was received, read and ordered filed, see Exhibit No. 3026.

"Baltimore, Md., July 25th., 1910.

To The Honorable,

Board of Police Commissioners.

Gentlemen:-

The Sunday Liquor Law was violated yesterday, 24th. instant, in the Eastern, Northeastern, Northwestern and Southern Districts, and the cases are hereunder:-

Eastern District.....Saloon of Louis Jacobs, 1418 E. Lombard st., raided by Sergt. Thomas J. Barry and Patrolman Fred'k Schlingman, in uniform and Patrolman John F. Wankmiller, John G. Nitzel and Michael F. Frawley, in plain clothes. Proprietor arrested and two patrons (Harry Ellenberg and Benjamin Goodman) taken in custody. Two glasses secured as evidence. Witnesses in their testimony denied that beer was furnished them, whereas officers claim they saw glasses containing beer in their hands and witnesses Goodman when he emptied the glass. Both witnesses charged with perjury and released on bail furnished by Jacobs for the action of the Grand Jury. Jacobs was also released on bail furnished by his wife.

John F. Wankmiller, John G. Nitzel and Michael F. Frawley, patrolmen working in plain clothes, arrested Fred'k Holmes, 721 S. Broadway, for selling liquor on Sunday. Eight men were found in the place and four glasses containing beer secured as evidence. Case to be tried this a.m.

Saloon of Otto Lange, 816 E. Lombard street, was raided by Sergts. Oliphant and Quirk and Patrolman Dougherty of Headquarters. Six men were found in the yard and the evidence consisted of two empty glasses. Case to be tried this a.m.

Northeastern District. .. Saloon of John Farrell, 1131 Greenmount avenue, raided by Sergt. Frank R. Gatch and Patrolmen Charles E. Lentz and William G. Kreisel, and five witness taken into custody. Proprietor was not at the place at the time and the bartender, who is unknown to us, made his escape. Three glasses, two containing lager and one containing weiss beer, secured as evidence. Warrant sworn for Mr. Farrell and he was subsequently arrested, and released for a hearing this a.m.
