

Northwestern District.....Rd. Sgt. Stephen G. Nelson, Sergt. John A. Way and Patrolmen Charles C. Brandt, John A. Coffay and Edward J. Dunn, raided the rooms of the Echo Pleasure Club, 2217 Penna. Ave., and arrested nine persons whom they charged with gaming on Sunday. Case against prisoners dismissed by Justice Tyson.

Southern District.....Officers John A. Cooney and John R. Handloser raided the saloon of Louis Kuchli, 1400 Decatur street, where they found one man and a recently emptied beer glass. Man brought to station and held as witness. Kuchli was arrested but when it was subsequently learned the license was in the name of Louis Buchsbaum he was dismissed and a warrant issued for Bucksbaum, who was later arrested and committed for court by Justice Lewis

Patrolman John A. Cooney, John R. Handloser, George F. Kaiss and William Dull, in plain clothes, raided saloon of Louis Roche, 1054 William street. A white man and a boy were present in the saloon. Roch was arrested and a dual charge was placed against him, - for selling liquor on a Sunday and to a minor. Released on bail for court in both cases.

Patrolmen John A. Cooney and John R. Handloser, in plain clothes, raided saloon of Edward Seifert, 1421 Battery avenue, where they found two white men. Seifert was arrested for selling liquor on Sunday, but the charge was dismissed by Justice Lewis.

Patrolmen John A. Cooney and John R. Handloser gained access to the saloon of Frank Seifert, 1201 William street, and found therein four white men. One glass of beer and one glass of whiskey were secured as evidence. Seifert released for court and the men dismissed.
