Boxing Match.
Re. Harry Stone.

Harry Stone, accompanied by Lawrence L. Kaufman, Counsel, appeared before the Board and stated through his counsel that he had a wife and child to support and had no other business than that of engaging in boxing exhibitions; is without means and asked the Board to permit him to engage in boxing contests. He said that he was sorry that he permitted his temper to get the better of him when engaged in a boxing match on the night of June 29, 1910, and stated that if the Board would re-consider its action of June 30, 1910, he would in the future conduct himself in a proper manner.

The Board, upon the promise of Stone to do better in the future re-considered its decision, as referred to in the minutes of June 30, 1910, and instructed that, until otherwise ordered permits be granted for boxing contests in which Stone may be engaged to appear.
