With regard to premises 700 - 701 - 712 and 720 N. Howard st., I beg to say that this post in A. Division is patrolled by Patrolman Robert L. Kaufman of the Northwestern District. I had this patrolman before me to-day and he acknowledged having been instructed to make an inspection in regard to the Anti-Mosquito Ordinance, but he disregarded said instructions, and had not visited these premises at all.

In view of this neglect of duty on the part of Patrolman Kaufman I have preferred charges against him, and herewith submit the same.

As to the other premises mentioned in Mr. Lawford's letter I am now investigating the matter and will report further later on.

In the matter of Ten Dollars, donated by the Baltimore Investment Company to Detective George W. Davis for services in effecting the arrest of George Koneke, July 17, 1910, a report, as follows, was received:-

Gentlemen:-

In connection with the \$10. donated to Detective George W. Davis by Mr. William Charles Keene, of the Baltimore Investment Company, and which I recommended that Detective Davis be allowed to retain, I attach hereto a more comprehensive report from the detective concerned, and after a careful perusal of same I am inclined to think the "investment company" is in reality a loan company, classed among those more popularly
