

said diamond was the next day thereafter returned by Mr. O'Donnell to Mr. Boland; and that Patrolman O'Donnell took no steps to investigate the fact that a part of alleged stolen goods was in the possession of Mr. Boland, because of instructions received by Patrolman O'Donnell from his superior officer,

It was ordered that Patrolman Thomas P. O'Donnell and Detective Charles H. Weaver be exonerated from any blame in the premises.

Transfer.

It was, however, ordered that Patrolman Thomas P. O'Donnell be transferred from the post now patrolled by him and on which Mrs. Margaret A. Boland resides, to another post in the Northern District away from that locality; said transfer to take effect at once. (See Exhibit No. 3034.)

Trials.

Turnkey Joseph Brunner, Western District, was tried upon charge, as follows:-

C h a r g e :

" Neglect of Duty, in failing to find a revolver, when searching one George B. Boston, a prisoner, on August 1, 1910."

Turnkey Brunner was found guilty of the foregoing charge, fined \$25. and cautioned that a repetition of such an offense will subject him to more severe punishment.

Patrolman Robert L. Kaufman, Northwestern District, was tried upon charge, as follows:-

NEGLECT OF DUTY.

Specifications:

In that, although, he had been instructed in the early part of June, 1910, and again about July 11th., 1910, to inspect premises on his post for the purpose of bringing about a compliance with the requirements of Ordinance 184, of the Mayor & City Council, approved, December 3rd., 1906, known as the "Anti-Mosquito Ordinance", he disregarded the instructions by omitting entirely the following premises, viz:

700-701-712 and 720 N. Howard street."

The case was held under advisement.
