

Trumbo Case.  
National Bank of Commerce.

In the matter of the Trumbo case, now under inquiry by the Board, as referred to in the proceedings of August 1st., 1910, the President reported that on Tuesday, August 2nd., Mr. A.J. Pumphrey, formerly Captain of Detectives, had called at his office and made a statement to him, admitting that twenty dollars had been paid to him by the National Bank of Commerce in the Trumbo case for the benefit of the members of the detective department who had been engaged on the said case, and that, he, Pumphrey, had applied the twenty dollars to as aforesaid paid to him, to his own benefit to partially reimburse him for the payment of an amount in the neighborhood of \$68. paid by him to the bank on account of rebate due by Alexander Chapman in connection with a horse and buggy figuring in the Trumbo case, which rebate had been guaranteed to the bank by Pumphrey in the sale of the team by the Bank to Pumphrey for Detective Wm. M. Atkinson.
