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Anti-Mosquito Ordinance.

A report, as follows, was received from the Marshal, and the recommendations as therein contained, were approved. (See Exhibit No. 3040.)

"Baltimore, Md., August 8th., 1910.

To The Honorable,

The Board of Police Commissioners.

Gentlemen:-

In connection with the enclosed communication addressed to President Whelple by Mr. J. M. Lawford, upon the subject of patrolmen of the department failing to enforce the Mosquito Ordinance. I beg, respectfully, to state that I have already had Patrolman Robert L. Kaufman, Northwestern District, cited before your Honorable Body for neglect of duty as to premises 700-701-712 and 720 N. Howard street.

In connection with property Howard and Cathedral streets, I had Patrolman James J. Dempsey, Central District, before me, and he informs me that to the best of his recollection he received orders over the desk to enforce the Mosquito Ordinance, but that he did not look into the matter prior to July 28th. I would, therefore, respectfully, recommend that he be cited before your Honorable Body upon charges.
