

A group of Ladies, including myself, have banded ourselves together to try and help improve conditions and widen the interest in Eudowood, and one of the movements is to see if we cannot get beneficial orders, societies, organizations and churches, to pledge themselves to support a bed at this institution. There is excellent work done there and greater and more could be the work if they had more funds.

Now, as you have had evidence of results in case of one of the policemen, it suggests itself to me that it would be an excellent and practical idea to have the force support a couple of beds.

My plan is for each man to pledge himself to give ten cents each month, - this from 800 men (as I am told are on the force) would create a fund to support two beds for a year. At each station the captain could receive the money, and he in turn could pass it over to someone who might deposit it with some one appointed in the Commissioners Office. From this last named gentleman one of our committee could receive the sum collected, give a receipt and then turn it over to Eudowood Fund.

Understand, the police themselves, or the Commissioners would have the appointing of patient.

Our policemen have to brave so much inclement weather and are liable continuously to be infected that I am sure you can see how this idea of ours would be so practical, economical and valuable to your organization.
