Sir:-

Regarding Probationer Joseph M. Keen, Southwestern District, I beg, respectfully, to state that I took the matter up with Captain Thomas B. McGee and he informed me that the officer was not able to do patrol duty and would like to have a Clerkship. I then had a talk with Probationer Keen and he informed me that on account of an injury received to his leg some few years ago he is not able to do patrol duty as it affects the leaders of his leg and causes him much suffering. He stated that he would like to procure something easier in the department - a Clerkship for instance.

In looking over the department I cannot find anything easier for the young man and told him so, and even if there was I would be in favor of filling such places by older men and who have been in the service for years.

If Probationer Keen cannot stand patrol duty it would be better for him to resign and so intimated to him. He said that he would continue it for a while longer and see if he could stand it.
