Raids. - Saloons & Gambling Table.

Gentlemen:-

I am in receipt of the following reports from the Northeastern, Southern and Southwestern Districts, as to raids, etc., on saloons and gambling table, namely:

Northeastern District....Pursuant to telephone message received R.Sgt. W.G.Arbin, Sergeant F.R.Gatch, in uniform, and Patrolman W.H.Schone, in plain clothes, raided 137 Aisquith street, where they found a game of poker going on. The proprietor was arrested on the charge of maintaining a gaming table, and eight men who were arrested on the charge of gaming on Sunday. Sunday, July 23, 1911. Proprietor's name, Joseph Greenberg. Released for Court.

Southern District.....Sunday, July 23, 1911, Captain Cole raided the saloon of Edmund Barron, 235 Hughes st. where he found a number of men in the place. Barron was arrested, charged with selling
